Kuhlman Electric Buys Detroit Plant

The Kuhlman Electric company with headquarters at 2565 E. Maple, Birmingham, recently purchased one of Detroit's largest industrial plants from the NAFI corporation.

The former National Automotive Fibres plant occupying 350,000 square feet on a 24-acre site at 6925 Hoover in Detroit will be used for storage, processing and manufacturing.

Although the building will be reserved chiefly for warehousing, Kuhlman Electric plans to begin some manufacturing in December and some processing of materials in January.

INDUSTRIAL REAL ESTATE firm Hubbard Associates which handled the sale called it "one of the largest industrial real-estate transactions in Detroit in recent years."

The acquisition marks the firm's fourth plant with others in Bay City, Salinas, Calif., and Crystal Springs, Miss.

Mishaps with Firearms Cause Many Fatalities

"Bang! Bang! You're dead!" Sound like a child's game? It is. Yes, many adults play the game unintentionally—with real guns.

Every year, the National safety council points out, about 2,400 persons are killed accidentally by firearms. The main victims are persons 15 to 24 years of age, and children under 15, in that order.

How can FIREARMS accidents be avoided?

1. Treat all firearms as if they were loaded.
2. Don't release the safety until

3. Never fool around with a lethal weapon, loaded or unloaded.
4. Don't clean a firearm when lots of people are around. Make sure all cartridges have been removed from the weapon.
5. Keep firearms unloaded and out of reach of children and irresponsible adults.
6. Never point a weapon at anything you don't intend to shoot.
7. Don't practice-shoot at bottles or tin cans. For one thing, it's easy for bullets to ricochet.
