It was the only means of guiding the Skate through 50,000,000 square miles of ocean.

They exchanged ice cream for polar-bear steaks which were greasy and gamey. These were ultimately pitched into the sea. To top it off, the Skate made a 16-mile circle underneath the North Pole, to lay claim to the shortest trip around the world.

**ON THE SECOND** voyage in 1939 when winter had set in the Arctic, the Skate retraced the course with almost all its original crew, plus a new television set for monitoring their movement. They found ways of pushing up through the completely frozen surface. This they did by determining, through soundings, where the thinnest ice might be.

This was a tense trip. While most submarines give a wide berth to every passing obstacle lest it get damaged, the Skate was ordered to deliberately ram through to the surface.
