

Break-Ins Drop, Area Maps Plans

Break-ins dropped sharply in the "Around the Towns" area this week. At the same time, residents responded to the police request for cooperation, with Beverly Hills subdivision representatives gathering to plan an alert against the alarming rash of break-ins in recent weeks.

In Bloomfield township, the Thomas Tucker home, 4375 Derry, was entered last Thursday night by a thief who took \$381 in cash. Police said three doors to the house were left unlocked. Four children and their parents slept through the robbery, which occurred sometime between 11 p.m. and 6:45 a.m.

THE LARCENY of \$450 cash from an open safe inside the station was reported Monday by Edward Fitzgerald, owner of a service station at Maple and Telegraph.

L. Bill Reed of the Beverly Hills public safety department talked to subdivision representatives at a special meeting there Friday.

He recommended that residents notify police when leaving their homes between 6 and 11 p.m. or for a vacation, or when they notice unusual activity. The group agreed

Beverly Hills Ponders Downspout Regulation

All home owners in a large eastern portion of Beverly Hills should be required to disconnect downspouts carrying storm water directly into sewers from their homes, the village council determined Monday night.

The council announced its intention to pass a resolution calling for the disconnects at its next regular meeting, Nov. 21. The area involved is bounded by 18 and 14 Mile, Southfield on the west and Greenfield on the east.

The action was taken after study of an 18-page report and recommendations from engineering consultants Johnson and Anderson.

The report and large accompanying maps carried results of a months-long, manhole by manhole, study of the existing sewers in the area.

\$109 in Stamps, Change Stolen From Hahn Building

An estimated \$109 in stamps and change was taken Sunday from the Hahn building, 920 E. Lincoln, Birmingham, according to city police.

Detectives found various doors jimmied and desk and files ransacked in both the Root-Commer ville Blowers and the Marvin Hahn advertising agency.

The theft was discovered and reported by Thomas Edwards, maintenance man.
