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GOP Slates No Investigation Of Oakland County Ballots

"Only minor infractions" of voting regulations occurred in Oakland county during last Tuesday's general election, according to county Republican chairman Arthur G. Elliott, Jr. Elliott said Friday that he had received no communication from national GOP chairman Thurston B. Morton or state chairman Lawrence B. Lindemer relative to reporting possible local balloting irregularities.
 Telegrams were sent last week to state and county chairmen in 11 states, including Michigan, requesting information on any such complaints.
 Some national Republican leaders see a possible chance yet of a victory for Vice President Richard M. Nixon as a result of the close popular vote in the election.

BOTH ELLIOTT and Jack A. Gibbs, county GOP administrative secretary, said they knew nothing of a telegram from Morton. Elliott said he had a report that some former residents of Royal Oak township, who had left the township due to the urban renewal program there, still voted.
 He added, "How numerous this

was in the township I don't know." Gibbs said "We had several challenges there. They were bringing people who we knew had moved from the southeastern section of township to vote. How flagrant it was I don't know."
 "AS FAR AS wholesale irregularities in the county are concerned, we have no knowledge of any," Lindemer said. The Republicans had "some specific instances tagged in the southeastern section of the state, but we have not yet made a decision on whether to file a formal complaint."
 Royal Oak township votes Democratic regularly.

Second Troy Crash Causes Another Death

TROY — Two fatal car-truck collisions took the lives of two motorists in Troy Tuesday afternoon. Kenneth R. Froman, 49, Detroit, a driver for a drug store chain, Froman was headed north on Stephenson.
THE ACCIDENT occurred on Stephenson, one-half mile north of 14 Mile.
 A passenger in the truck, James Mullan, 41, Detroit, sustained minor bruises and Froman suffered a knee injury.
 Oakland county authorities in the county prosecutor's office will determine whether to issue a warrant to Zoelling after questioning him. Froman was expected to make a statement at the prosecutor's office Tuesday, police said.
 The two deaths bring Troy's traffic fatalities to six for the year.

THE TRUCK, southbound on Stephenson, was unable to stop for a red light at the intersection and after hitting Helfrich's car continued south on Stephenson, police said. The truck then hit a car driven by Duncan Gardiner, 57, Detroit, according to police.
 Gardiner, heading north on Stephenson, had stopped to make a left turn on 14 Mile. He told police he headed for the right shoulder of the road but was unable to avoid a collision.
 The truck driver's wife, Diane Zoelling, 22, was treated at Beaumont for multiple bruises on both legs. Gardiner and a passenger in his car, John Rowan, 48, Royal Oak, were treated by a physician.

 Telephone company repairmen from the Birmingham office labored from 4:30 to 8 p.m. in digging to the cable and drying it out. Telephone service has been completely restored.
