Congregationalists Observe Unique Forefathers' Day There will be no stockade around the Congregational church of Birmingham, 388 North Woodward, when worship will be conducted "after the manner of the first American Congregationalists." Nevertheless Sunday will be observed by this church as forefathers' day when worship will be conducted "after the manner of the first American Congregationalists." According to the Rev. Mead M. Bailey, minister of education, who will conduct the service, the special order of worship will be carried out in its austere simplicity. "BACK IN THE DAYS of the Pilgrim Fathers no instrumental music was permitted, according to Horton Davies in his book, "The Worship of the First American Congregationalists." In keeping with this tradition, the congregation will enter a sanctuary which will be strangely silent. Keith Dearborn, minister of education, will serve instead as preacher. "THE ORDER of worship to be used is based on research done two years ago by the Rev. Philip G. Scott, D.D., now Superintendent of the New York state Congregational conference. Two concessions to the twentieth century will be noted Sunday in the service. In the early days, "the pastor begins with solemn prayer continuing about a quarter of an hour." So wrote Thomas Lechford in a work published in 1642. Seventeenth century preachers were not considered warmed-up until they had held forth for an hour. Both local ministers stated, however that in instances, they would not worship "after the manner of the first American Congregationalists.
