Kennedy supporters were jubilant, but indeed the whole school found cause to rejoice in the fact that the year is already one-fourth gone.

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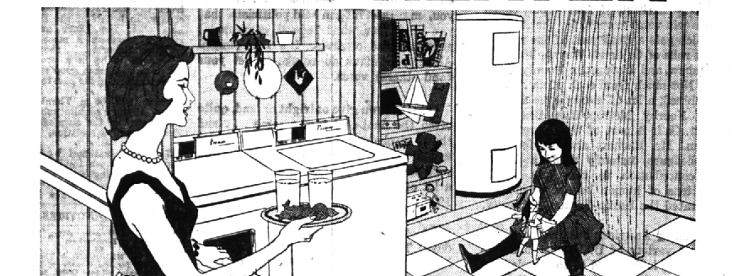
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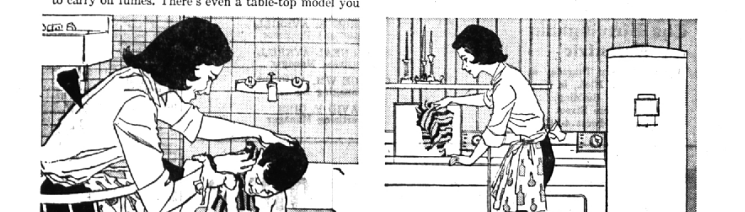
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
