A FEW YEARS later, my family and I moved to Sheboygan, Wis. We arrived there just a few days before the KKKer strike started. Then I saw brother hate brother and I was told that I shouldn't be friends with anyone who belonged to the union. When we moved here in a short time ago we attended several different churches. We are Baptists. To my surprise, I am now being told that my Catholic brother and my Catholic friends are wrong and I should not associate with them.

One of the ministers at one of the churches said, "I love a Catholic, but I despise the thing he stands for."

MAY I INTERPRET that this means that he loves a Christian but hates the Christ he stands for?

Now we have attended several other Protestant churches but in

all that we have attended, we have learned more about the mobli Catholicism than we have learned of anything else.

Do you wonder why I'm writing this to you? The purpose is—I'm mixed up—I've been taught to hate the Negro, taught to despise the Jew, told to ignore the union member—now I am supposed to condemn the Catholic.

I WOULD like for you to print this letter and ask the ministers and the people of Birmingham to tell me—who can be my friends and who of them must be requirements of being my friends! I am not a minister in Birmingham or vicinity who does not teach prejudice against any race or religion or people, please ask him to answer this letter in your paper because I am sure that there are dozens of other people who are tired of hearing about Catholicism.
