

Beverly Hills Man Still Critical Following Explosion

BEVERLY HILLS—A Beverly Hills man remains in critical condition in St. Joseph Mercy hospital following a gas furnace explosion in the basement of his home last week.

Albert Kray, age 40, 18168 Dunblaine, sustained a compound skull fracture, cuts on the face and upper body and minor burns.

Village police said damage in the home was limited to the furnace. There was no fire. A Consumers Power company spokesman said it appeared Kray was attempting to re-light manually a recently converted furnace.

The spokesman said Kray was converting the furnace himself and had not, as yet, installed automatic safety controls.
