It amounted to \$576. A Mount Clemens artist, Ray J. DeFrancesco, won the \$500 painting prize for the most outstanding painting in any medium for his watercolor "Jesus before Pilate."

THE \$500 Metalcraft prize was awarded to Ronald H. Pearson, Victor, N. Y., for his enamel and silver Processional Cross.

The \$500 Mosaic Prize was awarded half and half by the jury to "Fast and Present," a ceramic tile work by Frans Wildenhain, Pittsford, N. Y., and to "Angel Gabriel," a glass mosaic by Edris Eckhardt, Cleveland Heights, O.

Miss Eckhardt also won the Fisher Tette Memorial Award of \$100 for the most outstanding piece of work in any group.

The \$500 Crafts Prize was divided evenly between Zaida Stricker, St. Charles, Ill., for her silk-screen on-linen work, "Christian Wall Hanging," and Mary Ellen McDerrott, of Akron, O., for her enamel-on-copper work, "St. Luke."

THE EXHIBITION was staged on a national scale this year when invitations to enter were accepted by artists from Hawaii to New England.

The jury met recently in Birmingham to select the best qualified objects for display and to award the prizes.

The 38-year-old executive said that over a seven-year period, he had meticulously reviewed his interests with senior executive officers of Chrysler and was assured that it would not be necessary to liquidate his outside interests.

He also stated that he had assurances from Dodge executives before joining the corporation, that it would not be necessary to liquidate his outside interests.

CHRYSLER'S STATEMENT of his connections were "continually disclosed" since April, 1955, Minor, by virtue of a one-half interest in a partnership known as W & M Sales Co., received sales commissions of approximately \$20,000 on Chrysler business placed directly or indirectly with the Taxi-Ad Co., Bel-Aire Process Inc. and Transportation Advertising Co.

"Although Minor, when first employed by the Dodge division in December, 1958, informed his superiors that he had minority stock interests in the Taxi-Ad Co. and Bel-Aire Process Inc., he at no time disclosed to his superiors the receipt of such sales commissions from these two companies or from Transportation Advertising company."

CHRYSLER ATTORNEYS were instructed to take "appropriate action."

Born in Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 9, 1920, Minor entered the advertising and sales field in 1940 when he became a member of the staff of Loomis Advertising Agency in Kansas City. Before joining Plymouth he was general sales manager for Dodge passenger cars and trucks.

HE DISLIKES "rouffes" for women, but he likes divided skirts.

Though he doesn't discuss it, he seems to like pretty girls. But he obviously dislikes marriage, for he's still a handsome, 50-year-old bachelor.
