Albert L. Hopkins, Retired Executive

A retired General Motors executive, Albert Lynn Hopkins, 540 Berwyn road, Birmingham, died Sept. 28 in William Beaumont hospital after a brief illness. He was buried in White Chapel Memorial cemetery Saturday following services at the First Presbyterian church conducted by Dr. Harris. Arrangements were by the Bell Chapel of the William R. Hamilton Co.

At the time of his retirement in 1955, Mr. Hopkins was director of standards for the Buick-Oldsmobile division of GM. He was a graduate of Iowa State university with a degree in electrical engineering and gained experience with Western Electric Telephone Co. and the Studebaker Corp. before World War I.

DURING THE war he served in the Air Corps and was overseas for 18 months as a ground crew officer. After the war he went with the Prestolite Battery Co. in Indianapolis and remained there until 1928 when he joined GM at the Delco battery plant in Muncie, Ind. There he was the first engineer in General Motors working exclusively on batteries and played a leading part in the early development of the corporation's first units of that product.

IN 1935 Mr. Hopkins was transferred to Bloomfield, N. J. as manager of the GM plant manufacturing Delco batteries there, and he continued in that capacity through World War II when the division produced parts for Grumman fighter planes.

At the close of the war he was moved to Detroit and was director of standards for the Buick-Oldsmobile division until his retirement. Surviving are his wife, Alice; a daughter, Mrs. William Brown; and Mrs. Irma Slaght; and three grandchildren.

ANOTHER SON, James W. Hopkins, was killed in a commercial airliner crash at Ankara, Turkey, in January of this year. Contributions are being made to the Albert L. Hopkins Memorial fund of the First Presbyterian church.

Bond Issue Passes by Four Votes

Bloomfield Hills' \$1,500,000 bond issue to finance a sanitary sewer system passed by the slim margin of four votes as 420 of the city's eligible voters turned out at the polls for Monday's special election.

The proposal carried 166 to 184, achieving the required 60 per cent majority by a hair. "We would have been happier with a more decisive vote," said City Manager Elmer Kephart, "but, as in any election, the voters against a proposition turn out while many who are for it don't take the trouble to get out and vote."

Next phase in the life of the new municipal government is approval of the bonds and their sale from the Michigan Finance Commission. From there city consultant Dean Stanley will handle getting the bonds on the market through bond firms, said Kephart.

HUBBELL, ROTH & Clark, Inc., consulting engineers of Birmingham, will let the contract for the construction of the sewers after obtaining bids and submitting their recommendations of a firm to the city commission.

The final decision as to which firm gets the building contract lies with the underdeveloped areas. No definite date has been set to begin work on the sewers, city engineers believe they could be installed by the end of 1961.

Only \$1,330,000 of the \$1,500,000 bonds will be put up immediately, said Kephart. The remaining \$170,000 portion for sewer construction will be sold at an undetermined future date.

As far as increased taxes are concerned, the annual increase of \$6.48 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation will apply on next July's city tax and continue for the next 30 years, said Kephart.

"But the increase could be delayed until a year from then," he said, "depending on how long it takes to clear up the red tape and get the bonds sold."

KEPHART EMPHASIZED that the \$6.48 is an estimated maximum providing the bonds are sold at a four per cent interest rate, property tax evaluation does not change next year and the amount of bonds sold remains at \$1,330,000.

"All these figures are variable," said Kephart, "and the tax increase could be less."

Bloomfield Hills' city taxes now stand at \$22.00 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation. Twenty dollars of it finances the city's functions and the remaining \$2 pays for the Evergreen.

The \$6.48 increase, boosting annual city taxes to \$28.48 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation, will finance the construction of the sewer laterals, said Kephart.
