Fire Damages Home

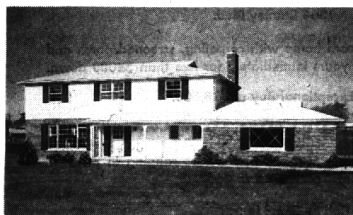

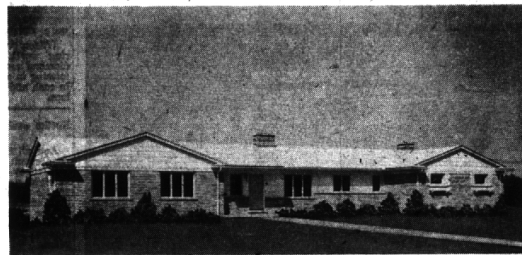

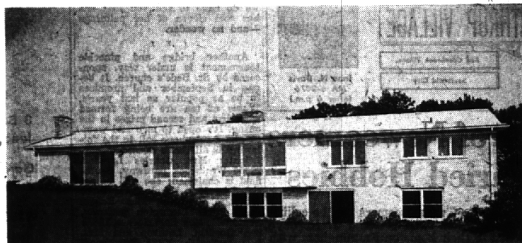
