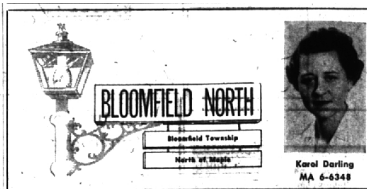

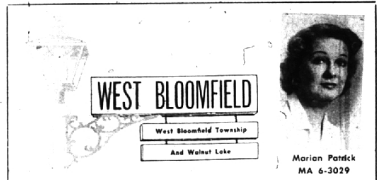

MARK STROKER, of Washington, D. C. was a Saturday evening dinner guest of Mrs. Robert Kreuz and her sons, of Braemont trail.

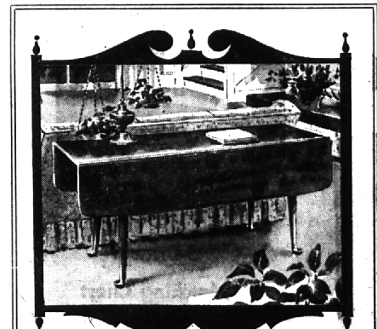
