Mrs. William C. Cowling represents the North End sewing group, which has sewn for the needy for 25 years and is contributing for the first time to the Needlework Guild.

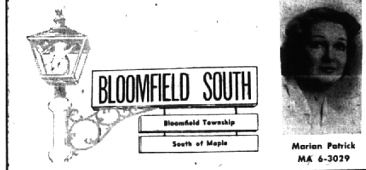
