(Continued from 1-A) field continued Elliott's theme by citing "nearly eight years of peace under a Republican administration" as one of the chief reasons for a Nixon-Lowe victory.

BROOMFIELD praised President Eisenhower's "firm" policy and criticized the Soviet Union, defended the policy in Cuba and Africa and urged the Democrats for "trying to end the electronic arms race."

Henry M. Hogan, Jr., candidate for Congress from the third district, was asked if he thought there was any particular reason why he and his opponent were skipped in Teasener union endorsements.

Farrell E. Roberts of Pontiac, GOP candidate for the state senate, pointed to a "Republican record of achievement in the state legislature" and called for the election of a GOP state administration.

With Paul Bagwell as governor, he would be able to pass across party lines and continue the record of progress, improve our industrial position and restore Michigan to the position of prestige and respect.

Roberts, along with Rep. William Hayward and Rep. Lloyd L. Anderson, issued a "clarifying statement" on the recent endorsement of the three lawmakers by the Teaseners union.

A Hazel Park sailor and his date were killed Friday night driving home from the Seaholm-Park Huron football game played at the Seaholm.

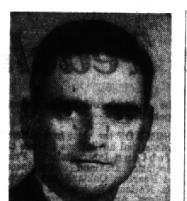
William Vivian, 21, and Margaret Ann Zigray, 21, both of Hazel Park, were driving on Big Beaver at Ryan, when the accident occurred.

APPLES are sorted, washed, "hammered," pressed, filtered and bottled, all automatically. Miller estimates he will eventually serve 3000 people each Sunday.

It is obviously a collector. Visitors will be entranced by the 1920 Model T fire engine in front of the mill, the 75-year-old pop-saw vending machine and the cigar table machine, which it can be hoped, may be moved from the site.

MILLER cherishes important things like his family. His daughter, Jr., runs the gear works and his three grandchildren, and his Dale as well, all share in the family ownership.

HIS EYES twinkle when he talks about his little eight-year-old "sharp" grandson but he is serious when he switches to the importance of maintaining water rights. Those involved here date back to 1825 and were held by a local resident.

From the board and batten exterior to the picturesque rocks at the base of the water wheel, the cinder mill and its twin building breathe an air of solidity. In this they are as typically American as their owner.

"WE HAVE a wonderful heritage and I am confident that we take it too much for granted. Whole nations of people have seen a chaotic society and the pursuit of happiness swept away by a whim, a folly, or a sudden grab of power by autocrats.

(Continued from 1-A) a suggestion from the city planning board to retain the property for recreational purposes.

CITY PLANNER Herbert Herzberg said the board's proposal was "entirely proper" because of the city's population of 315,000 by 1960. He said most of the property could be used for "passive" recreation.

Commissioner Carl F. Ingraham said he couldn't "understand why the plan board changed its position. . . I had previously recommended the zoning."

He added, "I don't think our financial situation has changed markedly since the land was purchased."

On the other hand, Commissioner William H. Burcum said the city has other land less valuable which could be sold to recoup its investment.

Commissioners had postponed a decision for three years to study studies to determine whether a zoning problem was involved. Residents at the hearing requested further postponement to see what would happen when "a heavy rain" fell.

GARE SAID the problem was not flood control so much as what the city should do with the property.

As for the planning board recommendation, Commissioner William E. Roberts said he thought it was "entirely too general to be valid for this particular case."

To home owners' contention that the city's filling in a portion of the land would increase the flood peril, commissioners said this land fill would actually have an "indefinite" effect.

ROBERTS MOVED that the northernly lot be rezoned, but Burcum moved to table the matter, drawing support from Commissioner Robert W. Page.

This motion failed with a three-to-two vote. Commissioner Charles C. Kennewick was absent.

Robert's motion to rezone then lost by the like count, with Burcum, Page and Florence Willett voting no and Ingraham, Roberts and Harry Denney voting yes.

Denney then moved to rezone the southerly lot, but his motion failed for lack of support.
