One Wrinkle Remains In Ironing Out Bonds

After several months of planning, one wrinkle remains in ironing out Bloomfield Hills' recently voter-approved bond issue for a sanitary sewer system.

George Hubbell of Hubbell, Roth and Clark, Birmingham engineers, told city commissioners at Tuesday night's meeting that there will be many easement agreements to be obtained from private owners before the sewer project can begin.

"Failure to get these easements," he said, "can upset the whole thing." Hubbell's firm is in the process of mapping out the places where sewers will have to cross private property and expects to have an estimate of the number of such easements by next month's meeting.

"I THINK WE'RE going to have a little delicacy on the easements problem," said Mayor Henry Woolfenden, "but I also think we're going to get them."

According to City Clerk Robert J. Stadler, the city can either condemn or go around the private property if it is unable to obtain easement agreements. "But," he said, "condemning would mean long drawn out court procedure which might delay the sewer project."

The commission carried two resolutions, one approving a notice of intent to issue the bonds covering the whole \$1,500,000 and a second approving the manner and details of their sale.

THE BONDS WILL not be sold until financial consultant Dean Stanley obtains the state finance commission's approval of the sale and bids are obtained for contracting the job.

City bonding attorney Milton Thompson estimates March 1 as the starting date for construction of the sewers with completion expected by the end of 1961.

In other monthly business the commission confirmed a \$34,743.98 bid for widening of Long Lake road east and west through most of the commercial district. The cost of the road's widening from two to four lanes will be shared 50-50 by the city and county.

STADLER CALLED the commissioners attention to a \$9000 robbery at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Wilson, 711 Kennebec Court in the Rudgate subdivision on Sept. 28. Jewelry and clothing were stolen.

This grand larceny is one of several other simple larceny cases, said Stadler. "It looks like it is the same group in each case," he said. The matter is being investigated.

THE COMMISSION also resolved to appoint six election workers for each of Bloomfield's two precincts for the Nov. 8 election.

STADLER REPORTS an additional 212 registered voters since August, boosting the total registered to 1670 out of a population of 2170. Almost 100 have requested absentee ballots.
