Couple Married In Grand Forks

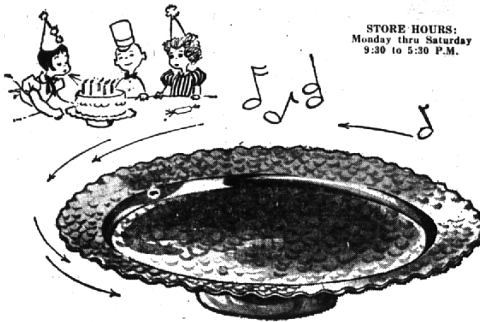
