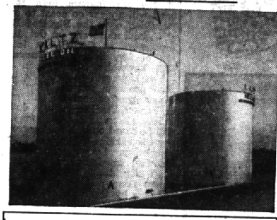
MISS Lyla McCormick, a language arts teacher at Barnum, has charge of the Usher's and

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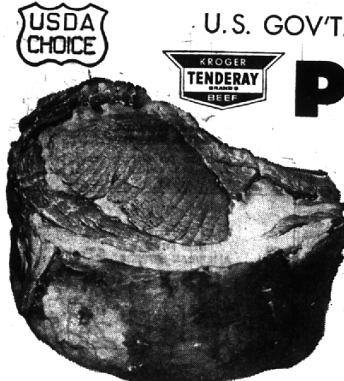
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
