

College Board Chooses School As Test Center

The College entrance examination board has chosen Southfield high school as a new testing center. Board examinations must be given here a slight matter of an out-of-state college as well as Albion, Calvin or Kalamazoo.

Stanford Burr, college advisor at Southfield, explained, "We have a very high percentage of students going on to college. Because of this and the fact that the schools in Michigan are now requiring board exams of all students, Southfield was asked to serve as one of the testing centers. This will make it more convenient for our students and those from surrounding schools."

In the past, students from this area had to go to Reedwood board tests. Students from Clawsonville, Farmington and any others who wish to take the examinations will now come to Southfield high school.

The tests are divided into three parts. The Scholastic aptitude test will be given in December and January of this year. The Achievement tests will be given in December only. The Writing sample test will be given in December and January.

In order to determine which tests the student needs, he must find out the admissions requirements of the colleges in which he is interested. Within five weeks after the test date, score reports will be sent to the student and scholarship sponsor if the student has designated. Duplicate reports will be sent to the high school.

THE STUDENT COUNCIL of Southfield is holding a leadership conference on Oct. 19 at 1 p.m. John Gillespie, Student Council president, explained, "The purpose of this conference is to create within the school the know-how of leadership in each club and individual."

Some of the topics that will be discussed are duties of a leader, publicity, leadership, public speaking and public relations. The guest speakers will be Edward W. Wood, Stanford Burr, Robert Hall, Robert W. Wally, Mrs. Letitia Muir and Daniel Julian. Student members are also taking part in the program. They are: Don Armstrong, Sydella Becker, John Ferris, John Gillespie, Judy Parker and Wes Wilson.

NEW REPORT cards will be issued every 10 weeks instead of every six weeks at Southfield high school. These cards will allow the family to maintain personal record of their child's progress since it does not have to be returned to the school.

Cla's time will not be interrupted by the teacher signing cards because it will be given, already signed, to the students before school is out. It will be much smaller in size than the report card. There will be two parts to it; one will be given to the students to take home and the other given to the counselors so they will have a duplicate copy at all times.

Field day is one of Seaholm's oldest traditions and it is carried out with all the splendor of the Olympic games, including the Olympic torch, runner and victory stand.

This year's Field day is being directed by a steering committee that includes Mrs. Carol Barling, director of extra-curricular activities; Tom Woodworth, chairman; Nancy Thalacker, senior chairman; Sue Hobbleswhite and Francis Quill, junior chairman; Yvick Kytze, sophomore chairman; Bob Holland, equipment; Jeff Gilbert, contact; Bob Kennedy, judge; Larry Stevens, P. A. and scoreboard and the president of each of the three classes.

Each class has a chairman for the following committees: parade, costumes, cheering, banners, contestants, girls' contestants and clean-up. The seniors will wear red and white for their class colors, the juniors will use blue and white and the sophomores will use green and white.

Each class is limited to a maximum expenditure per person and a report of the total amount they spend will be due the week after Field day.

All work on Field day must be done by the students themselves and not by their parents or any other professional person. Each class will meet once during school time and once at night. At these meetings, the class will practice their marching and cheering.

THE PARADE will begin at 12:04 p.m., Friday, Oct. 14. It will take place on Cranbrook at Lincoln road. After the parade, the entire student body and faculty will go into the gym for competition in cheering and events.

The events are the flag-shuttle relay, tug-of-war, sack race, three-legged race, egg throw, barrel race and tractor race for boys, six foot and over.

Field day is open to visitors but due to the large Seaholm student body, the seating space is limited.

THE SEAHOLM student government consists of two main bodies: the Senate and the Congress. Each of these bodies elect honorary members at the beginning of the first and second semesters. They are elected because of the quality of their letters and their past experience in student government.

Elected to the Senate as honoraries are Holly Schuler, Karon Smith and Virginia Griscam. Honorary members of the Congress are Robert C. Grant and Paul W. Kasch.

Senior finalists will take another examination, the three-hour Scholastic aptitude test of the College entrance examination board, given throughout the nation on Dec. 8.

STUDENTS WHO qualify as a result of this test and who are endorsed by their high schools will become finalists in the competition. More than 95 per cent of the semi-finalists have become finalists in past years.

As finalists, they will be eligible for scholarship awards sponsored by 115 organizations. Merit scholars will be named about May 1, 1961.
