BLOOMFIELD HILLS—A special school election has been set for January in Bloomfield Hills school district number two. Property owners will be asked to authorize issuance of bonding and site bonds totaling \$4,135,000.

The resolution does not alter a plan for one made at the Oct. 3 council session but does implement it. The earlier resolution authorized the attorney Everett H.
