### Elevens Win One Game; Shut Out in Another

In a hard-fought game, on Oct. 7 at Pierce field, Barnum defeated Derby by a score of 20 to 14.

In the first quarter, Ron Jacobson, Barnum left end, picked up a Derby fumble and ran 25 yards for a touchdown. He did not make the extra point.

During the second period, Brent Miller, Barnum fullback, scored on a right end sweep of 55 yards with Greg Russell, left halfback, making the extra point.

Derby ran about 30 yards for a touchdown on a reverse, in the third quarter. Their extra point was blocked. Barnum kicked a punt and threw to Don Oatman, right end, for a touchdown, which covered about forty yards; Russell made the extra point.

On the last play of the game, Derby scored on a combination pass and run which covered about forty yards and made the extra point. Summing up his feelings about the game, Coach Gibson stated, "This was the hardest fought game I have seen at Barnum in five years."

Barnum eighth grade football players were defeated by Derby's grade team by a score of 54 to 0.
