

# Come One! Come All! To PTA County Fair

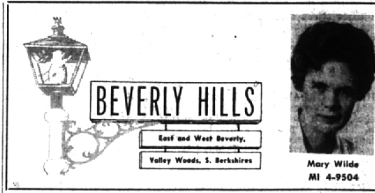

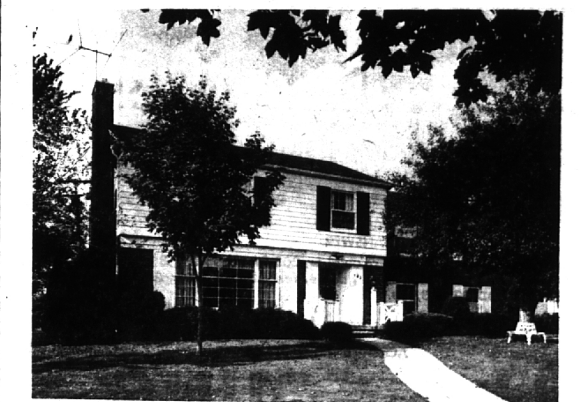

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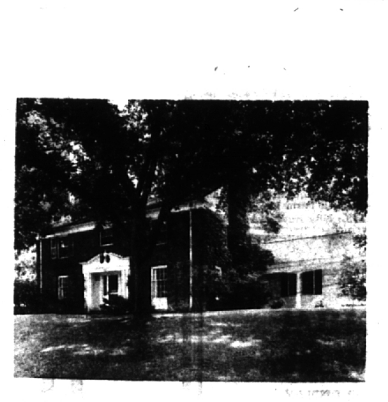


## Kids by the Carload

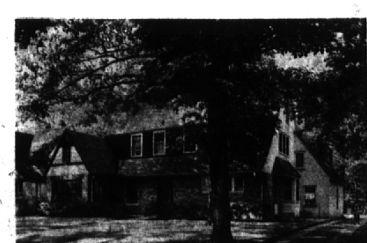
