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Hogan Hurls Charge at State Dems

The Republican candidate for the third district legislative seat has charged that Democrats want to solve Michigan's economic problems with "measures that would plunge our state into utter chaos."

Henry M. Hogan, Jr., 4253 W. Orchard Hill, Birmingham, told a meeting of independent voters here last week that Democrats polities and a "union-dominated" administration have been chiefly responsible for "creating a poor business climate in Michigan and scaring off our industry."

"Industry goes where it's wanted and stays where it's appreciated," Hogan declared. "But during the past 12 years the governors office has been beholden to one segment

of the economy. No wonder businessmen have come to regard Michigan as an 'unsafe' state."

DEMOCRATS propose to improve business climate with measures that would actually make it worse," Hogan contended.

"Democratic legislation introduced in the 1958 and 1960 sessions of the legislature give a clear indication of how they'd handle Michigan's problems.

"First they'd hit employers with every tax in the book. Then they'd create new bureaucracies and regulations to harass business. And they'd cap it off with an income tax that places the tax burden on 60 per cent of the people and lets the other 40 per cent get off without paying a cent."

Hogan called for a return to "fiscal responsibility in Michigan government" and said the Republican party is "the only party with a program to restore prosperity and prestige to our state."

At the meeting of the Birmingham community council last evening at the Community house, Paul D. Carter, principal of Adams school spoke on the general sub-

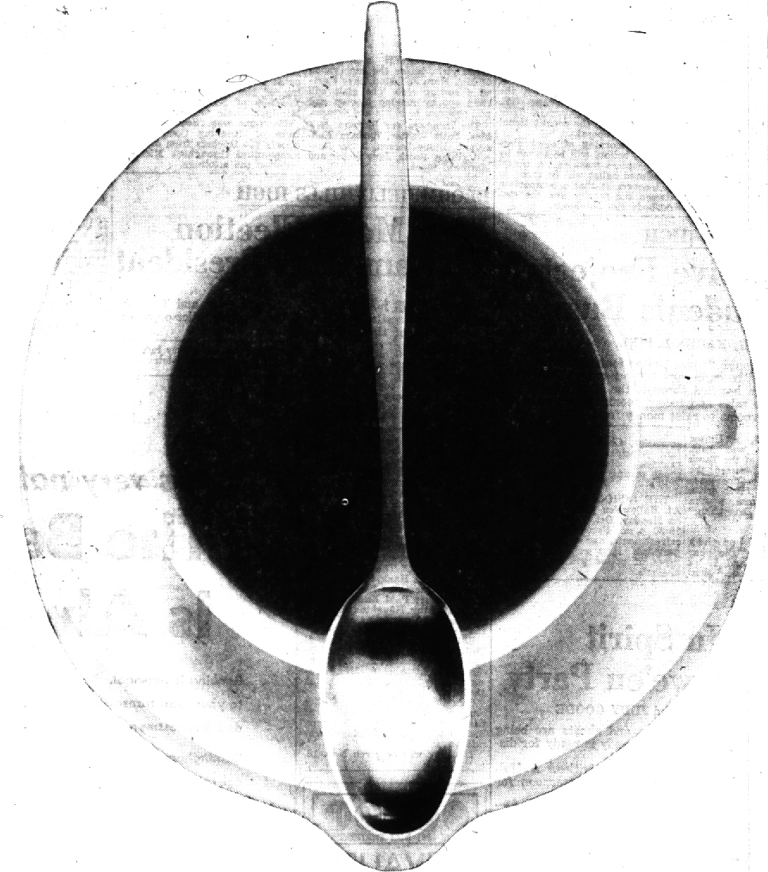
ject of a community adult education program.

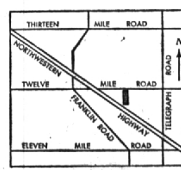
