

### 4 Judges Refuse To Attend Parley

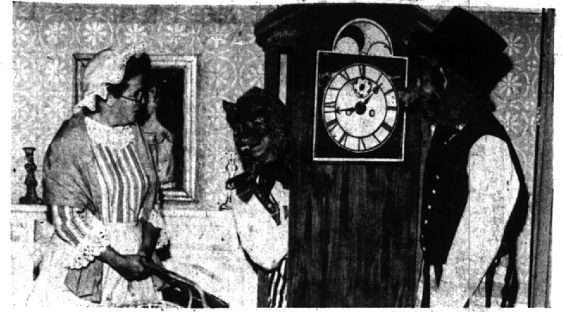
The occasion is the 100th anniversary of the birthday of Juliette Gordon Low, born on Oct. 31, 1860, who founded Girl Scouts of the USA.

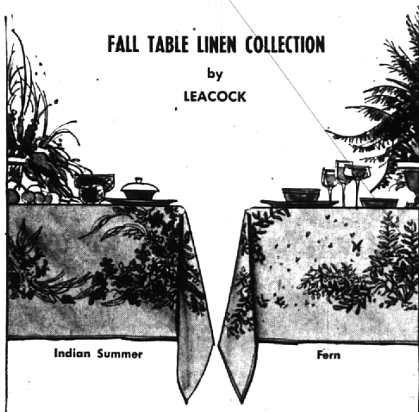

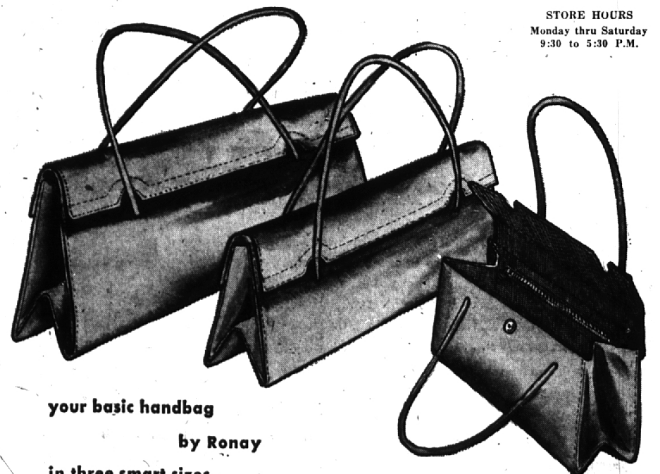
