

State Won't Pay For Underpass For Horses

BLOOMFIELD HILLS — If Bloomfield open hunt club members want a highway underpass for horses and riders, they will have to pay for it, State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie told them Saturday.

The commission received a written request for an underpass on the Chrysler expressway from the club's master of fox hounds, Albert A. Clark, 5025 N. Adams, Birmingham. Clark said the expressway would bisect the club's riding area. It is located just east of Woodward on Long lake road.

Clark also claimed the highway would damage the business of private and public stables by closing off a large recreational area. He noted the underpass might be most vital, from a civil defense standpoint.

MACKIE SAID the underpass could not be built from public funds but said "we would be very happy to build" it if the club or one of its members paid the bill.

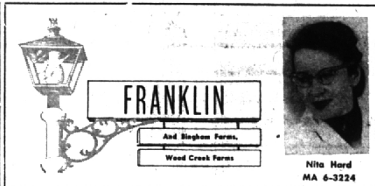
G. J. McCarthy, the department's chief of design, said they often build underpasses for farm-
