

**Pheasant Outlook Good for Hunters**

Local sportsmen who feel the stimulating lure of hunting pheasants may be glad to know that prospect for the 1960 pheasant season, which began last week, are good, if not the best, according to Kay F. Lagler, specialist in natural resources at the University of Michigan.

State game biologists have promised an average yield, which would mean a little over a million birds. The evolutionary process is making pheasants smarter and harder to prey upon, Lagler said.

"IN OVER 20 YEARS of pheasant hunting in southeastern Michigan, it has seemed to me that man may have accelerated the evolution of ground-running pheasants by selective shooting of flying birds. Had we started 20 years ago in an attempt to encourage ground runners, we might have done mostly what we do—shoot the roosters that flash."

The club is furnishing pamphlets for Halloween to be delivered to the Oakland County Juvenile Home tomorrow.

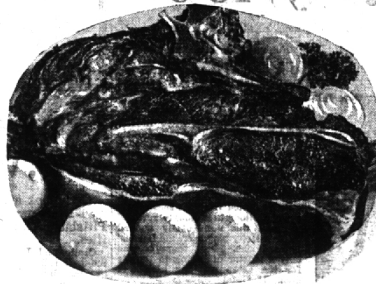
