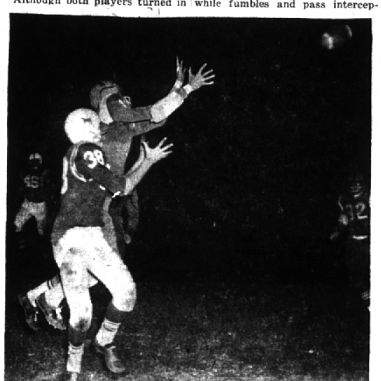


Lady Luck Frowns on Hills As Holly Stays Jolly, 15-6

The Barons' lone touchdown tied up the game, 6-8, in the second quarter as Bloomfield snapped back with a 68-yard drive on dashes by Jones and Stallworth. O'Neill then clinched the score with a pass to Jones who ran it in from the 15.

Bloomfield's pass defense and a couple goal line stands held Holly in check throughout most of the game, but the Barons just couldn't shake loose the bad breaks.

BLOOMFIELD threatened a couple of times but, as was the case in the last quarter, time ran out on Jones when he intercepted a pass on his own 32 and ran Holly's 40 with only three seconds left in the game.

Maples-Bathers Skirmish Ends in 19-19 Dead Heat

A feeling of helplessness pulsated across the gridiron Friday night amidst the faint shadow of hope for a last second touchdown as the Seaholm stands vainly screamed for time out and the seconds ticked off.

But, the Maples had exhausted their quota of time outs and Seaholm's most exciting battle of the season against Mt. Clemens finished in a 19-19 dead heat.

But the Maples players' ends in the tied line with their sons' numbers tacked on their backs found the explosive game well worth the trip and the nippy weather.

TO SINGLE OUT particular heroes of the game would be impossible for it was Seaholm's defensive line, working as a unit that stopped a tie breaking touchdown drive and salvaged a tie out of the game.

A fired up Mt. Clemens squad was the move in the last quarter with its aerial attack.

Being a running team, the Maples have relied on the line buck and end around to begin their play series with the pass reserved as a desperation measure.

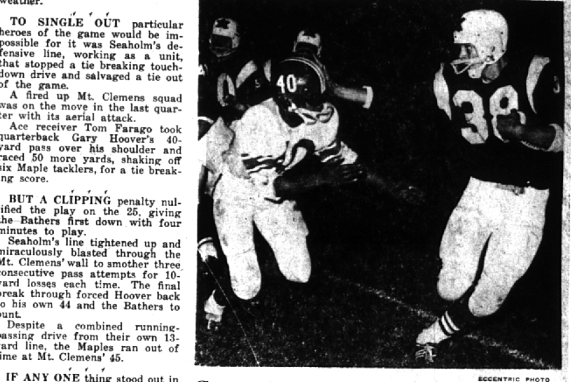
But Friday's game displayed how the pitch can be used as a surprise element with ground play results. Although not very successfully Seaholm passed more against Mt. Clemens than any other team.
