WHAT DOCTORS SAY ABOUT

High Cost of Accidents

Premature Greying

Blackstrap Molasses

Q. I have three children, all less than 5 years old. Hardly a week goes by without one or the other getting hurt. I know there is no such thing as "anti-injury" medicine but surely something can be done—what?

A. Eternal vigilance on the part of parents and other adult mem-bers of the family is probably the only sure way to reduce the drain on health, happiness and pocketbook that results from childhood injuries.

Q. What causes premature greying of the hair?

A. Greying of the hair is ac-cepted as a sign of aging but is probably the result of a question not properly answered the process. The cause is unknown. A doctor examined almost 4,000 dark-haired persons ages 9 to 92 and concluded that the greying process starts in childhood and con-tinues throughout life. However, it is usually not until men reach 30 to 34 and women 35 to 39 that the greying process becomes

rapid. An interesting sidelight is that cypress greying precedes eyelash greying in men whereas the reverse is true for women.

Q. I use blackstrap molasses because they say it contains a lot of iron. Is this true? What is it good for?

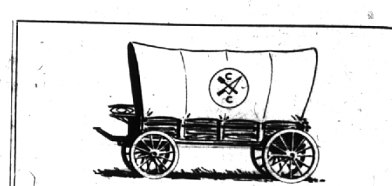
A. Blackstrap molasses is the final liquid end product in the manufacture of sugar and is used principally by fermentation in-dustries and as cattle feed. A good source of iron and calcium, nu-tritional authorities say that it does not have the special or mystical properties claimed for it by some food faddists.

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
