WATERS CONNECTING lakes Erie and Huron—the Detroit and St. Clair rivers and Lake St. Clair—are known for their action-packed walleye runs. Lake Erie muskie fishing, yielding several thousand of these jumbo-sized fish every year.

In Saginaw Bay of Lake Huron, smallmouth, walleyes, and pike capture the fancy of fishermen. Returns on perch are first rate throughout these waters as well as in Tawas Bay, a few miles north.

In northern portions of Lake Huron—Munuscong Lake, Potawatimie Bay, and nearby waters—catches of smallmouths, walleyes, pike, perch, and rock bass are consistently good.

Waters of northern Green Bay and Big Bay de Noe have gained national prominence for their walleye fishing during the last 12-14 years. Pike, smallmouths, and perch also provide plenty of sport in these waters of Lake Michigan.

SPRING, SUMMER, and fall find fishermen lining piers, breakwaters, and causeways along lakes Michigan and Huron for perch. No. 1 sport fish of the Great Lakes in terms of numbers caught.

Adult rainbow trout (steel-

heads) bring their share of action during fall and spring runs up the various tributaries of lakes Superior, Michigan, and Huron.

Sea lamprey have taken their toll in Lake Superior but deep sea trolling for lake trout is still carried on in some areas. Pike are popular catches in and along Keweenaw Bay.

From almost within the shadows of Detroit's skyline to the rugged wilderness setting of Lake Superior's shores to the dune country of southern Lake Michigan, the Water-Worlder has reason to be boastful of his "Great Lakes fishing."

Rods Tune Up For Nat'l Drag

Three Birmingham cars will be among the 300 entries, including more than 100 dragsters capable of speeds up to 170 miles per hour, in the 1960 National Championship Drag Races at the Detroit Dragway Sept. 1-5.

Dale Gilroy's X-Otariat dragster equipped with a '46 supercharged Crosley engine. Thomas Lehmann's Allied Special, motorized by a '59 Chevy engine and Robert P. Larson's '55 Healy with a '59 Chevy engine are racing to go.

The five day event, sponsored by the National Hot Rod association, is expected to attract 100,000 spectators.

HIGH SPEED roadsters, coupes, sedans, stock cars and sports cars will be on hand for that \$30,000 in prizes and awards of the sixth annual Labor Day weekend affair.

The program got under way at noon yesterday with elimination races beginning at 7:00 p.m. Saturday through Sunday and the championship contest on Monday.

Newcomers to the sport often wonder "Why the fastest car doesn't always win a drag race?" According to Ed Eaton, director of the NHRA, "A drag race is like a 100-yard dash in track."

"Elapsed time from start to finish is what makes a winner, except for the driver's top speed," he said. "A fast runner who stumbles at the start may easily lose his race to a man who can't run as fast. So in dragging, a quick start is all-important for a low elapsed time," he said.

and ordered the stadium buildings torn.

IT WASN'T until 1896 that the games were revived in Athens, taking on the modern practice of worldwide competition. With a few exceptions, such as the circus throw, the succeeding contests were modern in character, without any attempt to adapt the ancient sports.

Today, over 14 different sports make up the games.

By the 1936 Olympic Summer games, the Eleventh Olympiad, held in Berlin, 54 countries were competing. Russia didn't enter the games until 1952 when they came out as all-events leader in the 15th Modern Summer Olympics.

THIS STAGING offered an interesting highlight in lighting the Olympic flame. Starting out July 20, a relay of over 3,000 torchbearers carried fire some 20,000 miles, from historic Olympia in Greece (scene of the first Olympic contests) through Greece, Bulgaria, Yugoslavia, Hungary, Austria and Czechoslovakia, reaching Berlin on Aug. 1 to light the flame.

The Olympic flag appeared in Olympic competition for the first time at Antwerp in the 1920 games, consisting of a white background with no border, the center has five interlocking rings in blue, yellow, black, green and red. Each ring or circle forming the Olympic symbol represents one of the five major continents. Linked together they symbolize the sporting friendship of the peoples of all nations.

AT LEAST ONE of the flag's five colors appears in the flag of every nation of the world. The Olympic motto "Citius, Altius, Fortius," meaning "Faster, higher, stronger," is frequently found under the rings.

The games are more than just an opportunity for competition. They symbolize a worldwide effort to strengthen the bonds of international relations thereby encouraging good will and unity among all people.

As the games founder, de Coubertin once said, "The important thing in the Olympic Games is not winning but taking part. The essential thing in life is not conquering but fighting well."

THIS IS the idea embraced in the Olympic oath pronounced by a representative of the host country for all athletes on the opening day of the games.

"We swear that we will take part in these Olympic Games in the true spirit of sportsmanship and that we will respect and abide by the rules which govern them, for the glory of sport and the honor of our country."

use Terrain said.

The next item on the agenda is arrows.

"A hunter doesn't like to be bothered with a quiver full of arrows on his back to snag on branches or spill," Terrain said. Bow and arrow manufacturers responded by designing a four-arrow quiver which fastens to the bow.

"These four, plus one in your bow are all you will need out in the field," he said.

CLOTHING AND the regular hunting supplies (gun, ration, rope, compass, matches, canteen, etc.) are all that is left and no good hunter, bow and arrow otherwise, would go out without being properly equipped with these.

What is the most common mistake archers make when they are out in the field?

"They shoot too high and invariably miss the deer, or at least fail to kill him," Terrain said.

"As I said earlier, you must hit a deer in the respiratory system for a quick, sure kill with an arrow."

"ON A DEER," he explained, this area is in the lower chest, about 28 inches off the ground.

"For this reason, hunters practice during the off-season, on targets five feet off the ground. When they see the deer in the flesh, they just naturally shoot too high."

"A good rule to follow when taking a side shot at a deer is to aim just above his opposite front leg," Terrain said.

The opposite leg is the one on the other side of the deer. This is the heart area.

ANY TIPS for archers?

"Keep your arrows sharp and covered," Terrain said. "Your entire killing power rests in these shafts. If they are faulty, your killing power is diminished," he added.

Like all weapons bows and arrows are covered by strict hunting laws. Bows must be unstrung and in some kind of case when transported. If carried in the trunk of a car, the case isn't necessary but they must still be unstrung.

The wise archer will check with conservation department laws concerning the transportation of bows and from hunting areas, said Terrain. "Conservation officials are as strict as they are as they are on firearms laws," he said.
