Birmingham Conservatory Director Enjoys Music In Salzburg, Austria

EDITOR'S NOTE: W. Schrott, a native of Austria, at present director of the Birmingham conservatory and professor of music at Marygrove college, went to Vienna to visit his mother and also enrolled in the Karajan-Matacic conducting course at the Mozarteum in Salzburg.

"If you love music, drama, beauty of nature and what Austrians call 'Gemutlichkeit' (the old Mozart town of Salzburg will quickly become your favorite place to spend your summer for vacation or study.

The Salzburg festivals which attract a gigantic crowd of visitors from all over the world each year originated 40 years ago. Richard Strauss, A. Toscanini, Furtwangler, and practically every outstanding singer and instrumentalist has at one time performed here.

During the month of August when the festivals reach their peak, some hundred performances of operas, concerts, solo appearances, plays, etc., take place. Two of the world's finest orchestras, the Vienna and Berlin Philharmonic, are forming the nucleus of the opera and concert performances.

Especially noteworthy were the performances of Strauss Rosenkavalier under Herbert Von Karajan and several of the Mozart operas under equally capable conductors.

Among dramatic performances, America was represented through phonic form by the modern Swiss composer Frank Martin and as usual the production of the Hofmannist version of the Old English morality play "Everyman" performed in the Dom Square.

Austria still is relatively poverty stricken and it is hardly believable that its people are capable to rally all available resources to the support of music and art.

As we prepared to leave Salzburg, we met Mr. and Mrs. Ruban of 483 Aspen road in Birmingham, who came here to attend the last week of the festivals before going to Geneva.
