Mrs. Kelley Stymies Lathrup Street's Paving

LATHRUP—Concrete paving on Santa Barbara from Sunset to La-Crosse has been stymied because Mrs. Louise Kelley does not want to participate in the 1960 concrete paving program, four residents said at Tuesday's council meeting. They own property on the east side of Santa Barbara on which paving was to be done by Lathrup contractor Anthony Vittiglio, on a cash basis.

Also included in the paving program is a section of Wiltshire from Santa Barbara to Woodworth Way and on the latter street from Wiltshire to Dolores. Mrs. Kelley said she does not want to spend \$5,000 paving the unpaved Santa Barbara stretch, as the land would not be usable for several years.

She offered to come in on the Santa Barbara paving at \$10 a foot, if a block of Bloomfield, south of 11 Mile, can be included in the program. She asked that this strip, adjoining their own property, be paved first.

Lathrup Mayor Sees No Conflict With Engineers

LATHRUP—"I've plowed that ground," said Mayor Richard N. Cogger in reply to concern over "conflict of interest", expressed by Councilman Vincent Zattell at Tuesday's council meeting.

Anticipating a possible problem that might arise because city engineers Ayres, Lewis, Norris and May work for Lathrup and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Kelley on assorted projects, Zattell sparked a discussion that affirmed the loyalty of

ALN&M. Complaining that Kelley often remarked that, "Ayres said, 'do this' and I don't know anything about it," Zattell suggested a statement of policy be requested from the engineers.

Following a statement by Cogger that he had discussed the question with the engineering firm and did not feel there was any divided interest, Zattell said he was satisfied if the mayor was. It was emphasized that council approval is required for all proposals of the engineers.

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Twice-Monthly Rubbish Pick-Up Seen in Lathrup

LATHRUP—Rubbish pick-ups will be increased to twice-monthly service with removal of grass clippings for six months of the year, if a contract is executed with George C. Webster. His bid for three-years' service at \$64.80 per month was accepted by the council Tuesday pending a check of his service to Keego Harbor and West Bloomfield township.

Pick-ups will probably be scheduled the first and third Friday of each month with an additional pickup for grass clippings the first Friday. Grass removal will probably cover May 1 to Nov. 1 period. A contract with Commercial removal company, now expired, allowed for only one pick-up per month. The new additional service with Webster will cost only four cents more per unit.

Power Squadron Set To Hold Classes For Safer Boating

SOUTHFIELD—Registration for a ten-week free course in piloting for new boat owners will be taken Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. at Southfield high school. Classes begin one week later at the school.

The 1,900-member Detroit power squadron will conduct the classes. The classes will instruct boat owners on rules of the road, boat handling, equipment, chart reading, course plotting, navigation aids and other subjects related to safe and proper operation of water craft.

Certificates by the squadron and the Michigan waterways commission will be awarded on completion of the course and passing of the final examination.

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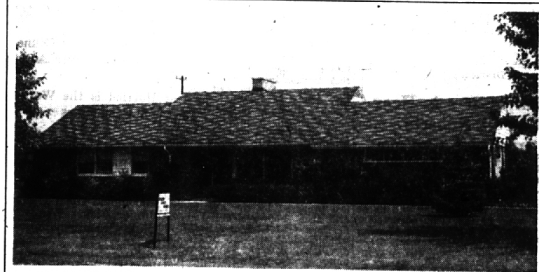
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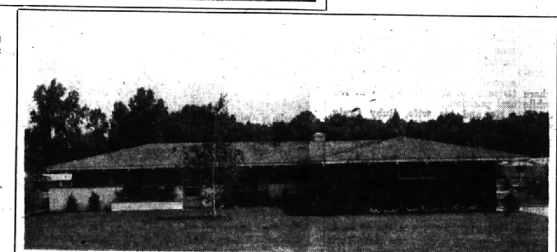
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
