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breaks between residential and commercial of industrial zones. ERO zoning sets a minimum of three acres for educational-research-office use while P-3 zoning is for professional occupancy with an 8,000 square-foot limit.

B-1 and B-2 are specified for neighborhood shopping and community shopping centers respectively and SC for integrated shopping centers such as Northland. Commercial zoning will be specified as C with a minimum lot size of 10,000 square feet. Final classifications are M-1 for light industrial and M-2 for general industrial. The latter requires a minimum lot size of 10,000 square feet.

Before final approval of the proposals, both the planning commission and the council will hold public hearings. Maurice Geisel, president of the Southfield business association said, "If you can satisfy about 60 to 70 per cent of the people, you've done a great job." S'field VFW Plans Hole-in-One Event

The Veterans of Foreign Wars, Durham-Roy Post 9952 of Southfield, will sponsor a hole-in-one contest at Sportland Golf Range, on the corner of Northwestern highway and Lahar road. Contest will be run for two weeks beginning Friday, Sept. 9, and will commence from 7 p.m. each day until midnight.

All golfers, young and old, beginners and seasoned, are invited to participate. The only qualification for eligibility to enter is to be able to swing a golf club.

A small charge will be made for golf balls purchased which will be put into a barrel approximately 75 yards from the tee. New golf balls of professional quality will be awarded as prizes.

All proceeds from the hole-in-one contest will be used by the Veterans of Foreign Wars in their building fund.

Ducks

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Hunters may have one wood duck and one hooded merganser in the bag and in possession.

In addition, bag limits on American and red-breasted mergansers will again be five per day and 10 in possession, singly or combined.

LAST YEAR'S bag and possession limits of five will apply during Michigan's 70-day goose season to run from Oct. 7 through Dec. 15. Not more than two Canada geese, or two white-fronted geese, or one of each will be allowed under this limit.

Coot bag limits will be six and twelve and the season will run concurrently with the duck season. Shooting hours on all migratory birds will be lengthened, running from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset, except in Wildwood and Sebewaing bays where hunting will be illegal after 4 p.m. Seasons of ducks, geese, coots, gallinules, rails and jacksnipe will be open, October 7.

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good cover, food patches and water sources to keep the birds within the limits of the preserve.

State laws keep the preserve system under strict control. Each preserve must show proof of the number of birds it purchases and hunting seals are issued for the percentage of birds that can be shot. Hunters must have a seal for each bird bagged.

The hunting is no different than any other kind, said Mann. "You have to get out and work your birds just like hunting birds in the wild," he said.

THE PRESERVES provides guides and dogs for hunting parties, but restricts each party to four guns. The Metamora preserve can handle six shooting parties at a time with each group having about 300 acres of hunting ground.

There are several advantages to the preserve system. They offer a place to hunt as well as assuring the presence of game.

Of course, said Mann, "We don't guarantee anything. Working and shooting the birds depends on the hunters' ability."

MANY OLD TIMERS of the sport are amazed by the difficulty involved and the quality of shooting required to bag the game," he said.

There is no competition as far as scarcity of birds is concerned and the whole system minimizes the possibility of accidents. "The danger of another party popping up and shooting over your head is eliminated," said Mann.

The reserve program is supported by conservation departments and sport groups throughout the country as the only answer to the game shortage problem.

"ALTHOUGH MANY people feel it is their right to shoot when and where they choose," said Mann, "population increases have knocked down that conception of hunting and left us with this way out of the problem."

Whether public or private, hunting preserves charge a fee for the sport. Metamora, which is operated on a club basis, has an annual membership fee of \$150 per family with separate charges for each trip. An afternoon of pleasant hunting runs about \$22.00 regardless of the catch while duck hunters are charged \$5.00 for each bird bagged.

"Preserve hunting isn't any more expensive than wild bird hunting," said Mann.

MADONNA LILY bulbs do best if planted as soon as possible. The price is \$1.25. Unusually large and heavy bulbs of the Chateau de Narce species.

COLCHICUM BULBS, which produce blooms without benefit of soil or water provide a multiple display of delicate pinkish-lavender blossoms to delight the most discriminative taste. They are unusually acceptable gifts for people who are unable to be out-of-doors because no one has to arrange them or care for them.

They can be planted outdoors after blooming and will produce for several years.

LAWN FERTILIZING now will produce the maximum root growth enabling the plants to fill in spots next spring (as well as this fall). Use 20 lbs. of 10-6-4 per 1000 sq. feet or 40 lbs. 5-10-5. NOTE: We have looked at many lawns this summer and we are sure we are correct in stating that "in general the best lawn results are obtained by fertilizing three times a year, mowing 2" high and watering deeply once a week or not watering at all.

LAWN SEEDING. Proper fertilizing, mowing and watering reduces enormously the amount of seed required. When seed is required we lean towards a mixture which contains no bent or rye grass.
