will recall, consists of a framework of aluminum triangles forming a semi-circular dome, to which is attached a black canvas covering for shelter.

The dome structure is 110 feet in diameter and 35 feet high. Ford used it earlier this year for a traveling farm equipment show and is loaning to Holy Name church for the up-coming exhibition.

Several hundred persons at a time will be able to view the art objects on display.

The exhibition will be open to the public without charge.

Judge Sets Deadline in Lassiter Case

Mrs. Nelle Lassiter, 19690 Beverly road, Beverly Hills, today is awaiting action on a court-set deadline to set the Lassiter murder case going again.

Wayne Circuit Judge Joseph G. Rashid has set a deadline of Sept. 21 for defense lawyers in the Parvin (Ill.) Lassiter murder case to submit a written request for disqualification of the judge.

Rashid was assigned to hear charges of first-degree murder and conspiracy to murder against Mrs. Lassiter and her husband's former partner, Gordon Watson.

After Rashid gave life sentences to three Chattanooga, Tenn., men for the killing, defense lawyers contended that these cases might have prejudiced the judge.

IN MAY, Mrs. Lassiter's lawyer, Joseph Louisell, asked time to put a disqualification request in writing. He has not yet done so.

Rashid will hear this request on Sept. 21 if it has been filed. Otherwise, he will hear arguments on that date on a defense motion to quash the charges.

Lassiter, Royal Oak auto dealer, was beaten, shot and robbed near Wilcox Run airport on April 6, 1959.

The prosecution claims that the three Chattanooga men, who pleaded guilty to killing Lassiter, were enticed by Watson to commit the crime.

Both Mrs. Lassiter, 37, and Watson, 44, are free on bond.

Rush Hour Traffic Control Plan Started

Birmingham police have begun a program to help even the traffic flow through downtown streets during rush hours, according to Police Chief Ralph W. Moseley.

Because of congestion between 4 and 6 p.m. weekdays in the vicinity of Maple and Woodward, two policemen have been assigned to strictly enforce traffic laws.

They have been instructed, Chief Moseley stated, to pay special attention to double parking, parking in prohibited areas, obstruction of traffic and any other maneuvers that would delay motorists.

CHIEF MOSELEY ALSO warned pedestrians not to interfere with traffic and advised them to use marked crosswalks.

The program was started Aug. 24. It will continue indefinitely, he said, depending on available manpower.

Newberg to Testify in Chrysler Case

William C. Newberg, 1411 Kirkway, Bloomfield Hills, will be summoned to testify Sept. 26 in a suit against the Chrysler corporation.

Newberg was ousted as Chrysler president in June.

He is under subpoena to give a deposition at a Detroit law office in a \$2,500,000 damage suit brought by Metropolitan Convoy corporation, a haulaway firm, against Chrysler.

The suit was filed in Wilmington, Del. July 16, 1959, and charges that the auto firm dropped Metropolitan's contract in 1959 after Metropolitan spent money in the belief that it would continue to haul Chrysler cars.
