

Christ Church Women To Dedicate Needlepoint For St. Dunstan Chapel

Episcopal Churchwomen of Christ Church Cranbrook will hold a special communion service at 11 a.m. Tuesday, Sept. 20 to dedicate needlepoint for St. Dunstan's chapel. This work was contributed and done by the women of the church.

The needlepoint project of the National Cathedral Association for Washington Cathedral is a project of the church. More than 600 pieces of needlepoint have been worked for the Washington Cathedral by women all over the country. The altar pieces for Bethlehem chapel in Washington Cathedral were worked by women of Michigan.

DESIGNS FOR St. Dunstan's chapel were executed by Mrs. Henry Barnshaw of the Needlepoint studio, Inc., Bryn Mawr, Pa. This studio had designed the canvases for the chapel of the Holy Spirit in Washington Cathedral.

Episcopal Churchwomen of Christ Church Cranbrook started their project in April 1957. Designs were approved by December, 1957 and the first canvases received in March, 1958. Women received instruction and samples of their work were submitted for approval before taking a piece to do.

THE DESIGNS on the kneelers and altar pieces reflect thoughtful research into the history of the life of St. Dunstan and include symbols of the work and wisdom of the women of the church. Women who have served on the committee include Mrs. Leithen, Leithen, chairman; Mrs. Robert Woodruff; Mrs. Ari M. Belcher; Mrs. Charles W. Taylor; Mrs. David C. Egan. On the present committee are Mrs. Edwin M. Bessford, chairman; Mrs. John F. Gordon; Mrs. Charles D. Marsh; Mrs. Charles M. Drake. St. Dunstan, born in Glastonbury, last serving the church as Archbishop of Canterbury, is patron saint of the arts and crafts. (There is a stone in the wall of the sanctuary of St. Dunstan's chapel which was brought from Glastonbury Abbey.)

SOME 123 PIECES have been worked in the red background and the gold which appears in a stained glass window above the altar.

Nine altar pieces include: two priest chairs—one with the coat of arms of Canterbury and the other with the coat of arms of Christ Church Cranbrook. These two designs represent the authority of the church.

Two priest kneelers have the coat of arms in gold on the top. One litany desk chair cushion has a horn and quill on it, a symbol of learning representing various.

Our Shepherd Lutheran Notes Rapid Church, School Growth

Our Shepherd Lutheran church, 2225 E. 14 Mile road, Birmingham, last week officially welcomed its first year, its first full-time musical director and three new teachers for its day school.

Mr. Lea Bruns, who preached his first sermon to the congregation two weeks ago, will spend the next year serving the needs of the fast-growing church and then return with his family to complete his pastoral training at the Lutheran Seminary in Springfield, Ill.

FOR THE FIRST TIME in its ten-year growth, the church and school will offer a complete musical activity. Ernie Brodrecht, well-known concert organist and former principal of a Lutheran-sponsored school in Sioux City, Iowa, is organizing musical training for Our Shepherd's day school children.

In addition to teaching the fourth and fifth grades, Brodrecht plans to organize and train three children's choruses of about 60 voices each, direct the senior choir and play for the services each Sunday.

A growing membership and constant increases in Sunday attendance have made it necessary to add an additional service to the Sunday schedule. Services now start at 8:15, 9:45 and 11 a.m. Sunday school and nursery run concurrently in Sioux City, Iowa, is organizing musical training for Our Shepherd's day school children.

The church's planning committee for months past has been studying architects' proposals for the development of an enlarged church and school to occupy most of the tract now owned by the church. It will include additional classrooms, a new church edifice, gymnasium and community service facilities. More than 600 pupils of Our Shepherd Lutheran Sunday school will be enrolled and promoted at the three services this Sunday. The children will meet in their old classrooms.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL will hold Rally Day services at the church on Sept. 18 at all three services. Sunday school pupils are requested to meet in their classrooms prior to the opening of the service in which they have enrolled to march into the church with their teachers.

The services will be geared primarily to the child's level with an object lesson, sermonette and a gift. The service will also include a short lecture on the importance and devotion of the parents to the Sunday school.
