state. Two young photographers, Diane Davis and Wolfgang Ladden were awarded white ribbons.

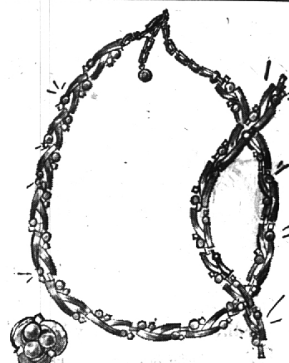
