Distributors Back Crackdown on Smutty Material

Prosecutor George F. Taylor's crackdown on smut has resulted in agreement with police by some county distributors of magazines and books, Taylor said recently. The investigation, conducted by Stiel and Pontiac Police Lt. William Nesbitt, was scheduled to be in South Oakland early last week to inspect all possible commercial outlets for questionable material, Taylor said. The investigators are combing newsstands, drugstores and other outlets in Pontiac for smutty material.

MONROE OSMUN, Pontiac businessman and school board member, was appointed by Taylor to recommend candidates for a five-member board in north Oakland to deal with the sale and distribution of pornography. North and south county representatives would combine efforts, Taylor said. The prosecutor said some of the materials brought to him by teenagers and merchants are "unbelievably filthy."

SEPTEMBER SAFARI

This journey is one to be taken through your own yard instead of on an elephant's hips, albeit it is more important.

WISTERIA VINES—If they have not bloomed they should be root-pruned this month. (It doesn't ALWAYS work.)

LILIES, NARCISSI, DAFFS—Get them in the ground as soon as you get them in from as soon as we get them. They are expected momentarily.

PERENNIAL AND HARDY ANNUAL SEEDS—Sow them now. A few packets of new-crop PACIFIC HYBRID DELPHINIUM seeds are here. They are the ROUND TABLE varieties—Galahad, Guinever and—well, that's enough.

STRAWFLOWERS—Pick them as the buds begin to open, tie in loose bundles, hand head down for several weeks while they dry.

CALLA LILIES—which have been resting in pots for the summer should be repotted. Use STIMULANT POTTING SOIL.

GOURDS—For winter decoration—pick before frost touches them. Cut two inches from the fruit and take inside to dry. My gourd!

BLEEDING HEART—Divide this month as you would peonies.

GLADIOLUS—Dig the corms when the leaves yellow, not when you feel like it. Cure or ripen them for a few days in the sun.

WEEDS—Suck the broad leaved weeds about the middle of the month with McLELLAN-BALL WEED KILLER, WEED-B-GON, or DUPONT WEED KILLER.

LAWNS—Fertilize a week before killing the weeds. Again we repeat: A LAWN IS NOT MADE BY THROWING GREAT QUANTITIES OF SEED AROUND. IT IS MADE BY

1. ADEQUATE FERTILIZING
2. PROPER MOWING
3. PROPER WATERING

SQUASHES & PUMPKINS—Permit them to ripen thoroughly before harvesting—the ripener they are the better they will keep (this applies to people, also). Store in a fairly warm place. (Some prefer the incinerator.)

EARLY PEARS—Pick them ONE WEEK before they become soft and store them in a cool dark place to ripen. How do you tell when it is a week before they soften? Well, it's a relationship between—well, why don't you just pick them and eat them.

GRAPES—Are different from pears. They do not ripen after picking. Keep in dry, low temperature for storing.

APPLES—Ready for picking when the green ground coloring disappears and the fruit separates from the spurs if turned with a rotating motion of (Imagine this) the hand.

LAWN SEED—One authority talking of lawns says, "The use of high-grade seed is taken for granted." Unfortunately, there are many seed mixtures on the market with fine names behind them, but which contain Highland Bent, Meadow Fescue, Perennial Rye, Alta Fescue or Kentucky 31. We suggest that you consider mixtures containing none of these varieties of seed.

CAST STONE BIRD BATHS & FIGURES—These pieces will not stand winter very well in this latitude. They should be covered when bone-dry with a plastic cover or moved out of the weather. CARVED ITALIAN STONE pieces require the same care.

HARDY CHRYSANTHEMS—Love a liquid fertilizer when the buds start to show color.

ROSES—Keep after the black spot and mildew. Use PHALTAN OR CAPTAN. One more feeding October 1st. PLAN TO PROTECT YOUR ROSES THIS WINTER.

TREES & SHRUBS—Check them now and remove all dead branches before the leaves fall. Later on you can't find them. A BARLETT SAW OR POLE PRUNER will do the job without the danger of a ladder. (We want you to be around next year, you big pruner.)

WHAT HAVE YOU? Why don't you label them with imperishable labels of one kind or another?

DELPHINIUM—A further display equal to June's can be expected if they are well fertilized with 4-12-4 after cutting them back.
