

Lathrup Curfew For Teen Aged Gets Reading

LATHRUP—Curfew may ring for Lathrup juveniles if an enabling law, based on a new state law, is passed. The ordinance, number 64, was offered for first reading at Tuesday's council meeting.

It would prohibit children under 12 from loitering, idling or congregating on public streets or parks between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. The law does not apply if the minor child is accompanied by parent, guardian or an adult delegated by them.

The same limitation would be placed on minors under 17, with their presence on the streets banned from midnight to 6 a.m. The older group of children would be permitted on city streets if accompanied, if on legitimate business.

A FINE not in excess of \$100 or 30 days in jail, or both, would be imposed on any person over 17 contributing to violation of the ordinance by a minor. Cases of offending minors would be handled by Oakland county juvenile procedure.

The ordinance must be offered for a second reading and publication before final approval.
