

West Bloomfield Acts On Subdivision's Sewer

WEST BLOOMFIELD—A sewer for Franklin Knolls subdivision seems to be in the offing, at long last, but it's expected to cost approximately \$150,000.

Resolutions three and four, part of the legal process in setting up a special sewer assessment district, were passed by West Bloomfield's township board last week.

A number of citizens asked the board to delay further steps until operation of the Farmington interceptor was assured.

Developments this week in the Detroit-Oakland county DPW dispute, which has held up connection of the Farmington interceptor with the Detroit disposal system, indicate that the Farmington interceptor will be put in use sometime this week. (See story, page 1-A.)

This leaves the board free to go ahead with the next legal step at a meeting scheduled for 8 p.m. Sept. 28.

THE FRANKLIN Knolls sewer was one of the first planned in the township, but has run into a series of complications delaying its development.

The original petition for the sewer, drawn up almost two years ago, was found lacking in legal description and had to be re-recruited months later.

AFTER ALL the required legal steps were taken, construction bids were 30 per cent higher than estimated costs. This meant all legal steps had to be retraced.

The next hearing will determine the assessment costs, per home, on the project.

Southfield Man Arrested Driving On Revoked License

BEVERLY HILLS—Allen Grant Steeves, 20, of 20000 Southfield road was found guilty on three charges after being arrested Sunday at 1:45 a.m. and charged with driving on a revoked license. He was arrested by Officers Robert Mills and James Davis at 43 Mile road, between Fairfax and Sheridan.

He pled guilty before Southfield Township Justice of the Peace Ted Sura on Monday. He received a \$15 fine, 30 days in jail and two days in jail for driving when his license was revoked. For improper passing he was fined \$15 and \$5 cost. For using another person's operator's license, was given a \$15 fine and \$10 costs.

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Request Honors Southfield High Principal Hall

SOUTHFIELD — Robert Hall, Southfield high school principal, was asked last week to become a member of the Bureau of school services, an accrediting service provided by the University of Michigan. He is one of three men Michigan principals to receive the honor.

Hall has not yet received a decision on acceptance.

His duties would involve visiting 30 schools per semester. Hall indicated he would serve only one semester if he accepts. He would be allowed expenses from the Bureau for each trip required to consider accrediting schools in the state.

Invited to serve for one year, Hall said too much time was involved for him to serve more than one semester, and his decision would hinge on the requirements of his position as high school principal. His staff has offered to absorb as much of his duties as possible for the January to June semester.

COMMENTS from school board members Monday were overwhelmingly in favor of his acceptance. They noted the benefits that would accrue to Southfield. Member John Campbell abstained from voting to accept Hall's nomination.

The Bureau will turn its functions over to the state next year. It has done the accreditation for the past 20 years for Michigan schools, and works in conjunction with the North central association of colleges and secondary schools as well as other accrediting groups.

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Telephone Company Invites Residents To Area Open House

The Michigan Bell Telephone company announced it will hold an open house program at its northwest office center, Southfield road and Northwestern, Sunday, Sept. 14.

Albert H. Warner, Michigan Bell manager, invited residents of all nearby communities to attend. He said there would be several demonstrations and displays of telephone equipment and installation methods. A tour of the company's accounting building is also part of the afternoon program.

This building houses data processing machines which perform many types of computing jobs, including payroll preparation, a \$10 million-a-month sum for Michigan Bell employees throughout the state.

The open house will be held from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m., Warner said.

Franklin Suit To Get Hearing Next Monday

FRANKLIN — The hearing set for Monday on the injunction halting construction of a new community hall in Franklin has been postponed until 9 a.m. next Monday, Sept. 19.

The Franklin community association is expected to present its defense against the temporary injunction granted by Oakland county Circuit Judge Stanton G. Bogdano in August. The injunction was requested by the Property owners protective association, a group of residents living near the site of the building planned on the village green.

Southfield News Briefs

Veto Up for Test, In Circuit Court, Declares Swanson

SOUTHFIELD—Is the mayor's veto effective on administrative actions or is it limited to legislative matters? This question will be asked in Oakland county circuit court within the next two or three weeks, Mayor Donald L. Swanson indicated Sept. 8.

Swanson expects to sue the entire council to establish whether the city charter provides for the extension of the veto to all council actions. The question was raised when he vetoed the firing of City Administrator Robert J. McNutt and the veto was ignored by a majority of four councilmen.

City Attorney James C. Allen has ruled the mayor's veto valid. An outside attorney, representing the four councilmen, calls it void. Swanson said the issue must be resolved for future purposes, hence his suit is necessary.

AT ISSUE ARE two sections of the city's charter, Sec. 4.20, headed, "veto," states: "The Mayor shall have the power to veto all ordinances, resolutions and proceedings of the Council."

Headed "Council Action," Section 4.18 reads: "The council shall act only by ordinance or resolution. The word 'Resolution' as used in this charter shall mean a fiscal action in the form of a motion, and such action shall be limited to matters required or permitted to be done by resolution, by this Charter, or by state law, and to matters pertaining to the internal affairs or concerns of the City government. All other acts of the Council, and all acts carrying a penalty for the violation thereof, shall be by ordinance."

THE first meeting is set for Oct. 18, 8 p.m. at the school. Parents will be invited to attend curriculum round table sessions at the high school level to acquaint them with the grade programs. They will meet with the teachers.
