JANE, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas A. Griffith of Suffolk road, Birmingham, sailed on the M. V. Seven Seas along with 131 other AFS students from all parts of the U. S.

Of this number, 32 were going to Italy. Also aboard were 250 foreign students returning to their homes after spending the year as exchange students in America.

Jane will attend the Liceo Scientifico "Giosuè" in Robbio, Italy, and will live with Mr. and Mrs. Adamo Ravacini and their two children, Renato and Silvana.
