Members of Birmingham's military gun club, the Eighth Michigan Cavalry, will assist other clubs in the midwestern United States Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 1-2 in reviving the past.

Costumed as frontiersmen and Union and Confederate soldiers whose shooting against breakable targets and military drills will re- capture for old and young alike all the color and realism of the Civil War era, Birmingham area residents will compete in the Midwest Muzzle Loaders Turkey Shoot at Greenfield Village.

Spectators will be exposed to all the trappings that make this period of history come alive—muzzle load- ing, marksmanship contests, cannon firing, flags, Civil War music and even a champion trick shooter.

A HIGHLIGHT of both days' activities will be two appearances of Joe Bodine, whose lightning-like draw has earned him the reputation of "the fastest gun alive."

About 275 shooters from 24 teams representing 18 military regiments are expected to compete. Both days' events will get under way at noon and continue to 5 p.m.

"SOCCER demands speed and endurance rather than strength and size," said Ussell. "A five-foot player weighing as little as 90 pounds could excel at the sport."

Unlike football, he said, soccer deliberately avoids body contact. The idea is to work the ball around the opposing team, and not through it.

But, said Ussell, avoiding body contact doesn't mean soccer isn't a rough sport. "It takes as much courage, if not more, to play soccer as it does football," he said.

WHILE FOOTBALL depends on the use of hands in developing skills of the sport, soccer is strictly a foot and head game which forbids the use of hands.

Imported from Europe, soccer claims one major difference from the European version, called football. American rules permit free substitution of players while the European game prohibits substitutions, even if a player is injured.

"AS A RESULT," said Ussell, "our game is faster and has a lot of long ball kicking. But European players are forced to conserve their strength and use a more controlled amount of running," he said.

However, Ussell believes American players have a long way to go before equalling Europeans' ball handling ability.

"He has indicated a willingness to comply with village desires and make an attractive offer to us," said Guilmet, who expects to report on it to the council Monday night.

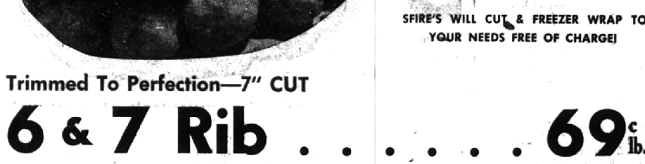
THE VILLAGE plans to use the land directly behind the village hall for parking facilities, and would hold the other lots for future development of cultural facilities such as a library.

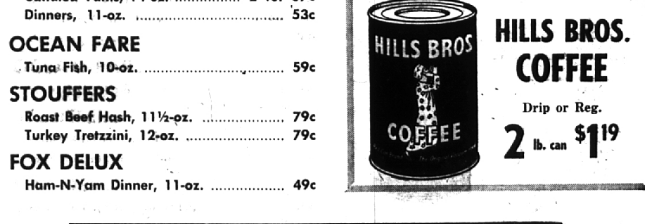
