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Famous Pianist To Give Concert In B'ham Area

Seymour Lipkin, pianist and former Detroit, will be the featured soloist when the South Oakland symphony orchestra opens its 1960-61 season, Sunday, Oct. 16, 8:15 p.m. at the Oak Park high school auditorium.

He was winner of the coveted Beethoven Award and has then has gone on to still greater musical achievements, playing with many of the major symphony orchestras in this country.

HIS CAREER was recently glamorized when Leonard Bernstein invited him to tour Europe with the New York Philharmonic, serving as soloist and assistant conductor. This will be Mr. Lipkin's first appearance in his home territory since that tour.

The first half of the Dec. 1 concert will be devoted to the young people of South Oakland county. It will feature Sheila Stephenson, pianist, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Philip G. Stephenson and a composition of Karen VanderKloot, daughter of the Robert VanderKloots. The Contemporary Civic Ballet with RoseMarie Flory, artistic director, will comprise the last half of the concert.

BECAUSE of the enthusiastic response of last year's concert version of the opera La Traviata, a concert version of Verdi's La Traviata will be performed on March 1.

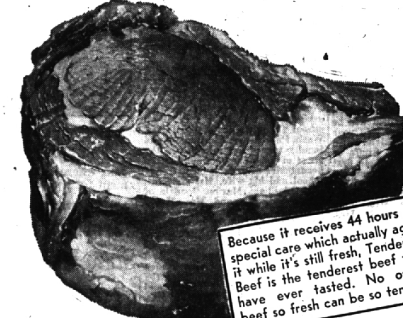
