

BITS OF BIRMINGHAM **Two Area Women Die In Sylvan Lake Fire**

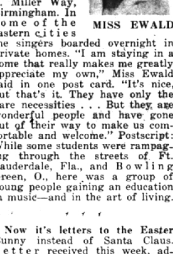
Judy Ewald is back from a trip which she found "educational and enlightening." She is one of the Michigan State University students called the State Singers who made a spring concert tour to the east coast March 21 - 29. "I am learning about things I never knew existed," she said in a letter to her parents. Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Ewald, 3835 S. Miller Way, Birmingham. In some of the eastern cities the singers boarded overnight in private homes. "I am staying in a home that really makes me greatly appreciate my own," Miss Ewald said in one post card. "It's nice, but that's it. They have only the bare necessities... But they are wonderful people and have gone out of their way to make us comfortable and welcome." Postscript: While some students were rambling through the streets of Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., and Bowling Green, O., here was a group of young people gaining an education in music—and in the art of living.

A Sylvan Lake home fire caused the death of two women. One, the sister-in-law of former Chrysler President William C. Newberg, Mrs. Hildegard Laird, 46, of Berkeley, sister of Newberg's wife, Dorothy, and Mrs. Ethel Van Hecke Vrooman, 65, owner of the home at 3295 Orchard Lake, where the fire occurred early Sunday, failed in attempts to escape from the burning house.
 Mrs. Vrooman's body was found on the kitchen floor at the foot of the stairway. Mrs. Laird's body was lying in the upstairs hallway.

An insurance business from her home, Mrs. Laird, who was spending the night with her, was the daughter of Charles W. Beck, Detroit industrialist living in Los Angeles.
 She is survived by her husband, from whom she was getting a divorce, father, mother, two brothers and a sister.
 Services were Tuesday at the Verheyden Funeral Home, Grosse Pointe. Burial was at the Woodlawn Cemetery.
 Services for Mrs. Vrooman were held Wednesday at Hutton Funeral Home, Pontiac. She was buried at White Chapel Cemetery.
 Surviving are a son, William, from Los Angeles, a daughter, Arlene of Okla., and a sister also from Los Angeles.

OAKLAND COUNTY Sheriff's Deputy Roland Pless discovered the fire at 12:55 a.m. while on his way home from work. He said he made attempts to gain entry to the house but was unable due to careless smoking.
 He knocked on all windows and climbed a tree to rap on second floor windows in an attempt to rouse the two occupants.
 West Bloomfield Township Fire Chief Herbert Morgan said the blaze started in an armchair in the living room, apparently from careless smoking.
TWO PUMPER trucks battled the blaze for nearly three hours. Damage was confined to the front of the frame house. The living, dining and bed rooms were destroyed completely.
