Civic Groups Join MSU in Study Program

Leagues of Women Voters in Birmingham, N.E. Bloomfield, and Southfield, Oakland County Republican and Democratic parties, and the Oakland County AFL-CIO will join Michigan State University Oakland's Continuing Education Department in presenting a study program on a review of American foreign policy. The Foreign Policy Association is a co-sponsor of the program.

The program is designed to give citizens a "long, hard look at some of the critical issues facing the United States in 1961," said Dr. William Rhode, assistant director of Continuing Education and developer of the program. "Only an informed populace can direct the government in its effort to protect the ideals and institutions of the free world," Rhode said.

"IF THE CONCEPT of popular government is going to remain the basic pillar of American democracy," he said, "it is absolutely necessary that our citizens give attention and study to a review of the various foreign policy alternatives and raise their voices in support of the most desirable policies." In meeting their responsibility, Rhode said, the citizens deserve all the assistance that can be offered. "In this regard, organizations specifically concerned about American foreign policy, community groups anxious to promote the health and vitality of a free society, and universities and colleges can perform a valuable service by 'joining hands' to provide an opportunity for citizens to come together for review, study and discussion of the great issues of foreign policy facing the nation today," Rhode said.

THE REVIEW COURSE, beginning April 10 on the MSU cam-

pus, will deal directly with "Soviet Challenge and World Leadership," "Deadlock over Germany," "UN in Explosive Africa," "Japan - Future of an Asian Ally," and "Ferment in South America." MSU faculty members Dr. Sheldon Appleton, assistant professor of political science; Dr. Melvin Cherns, assistant professor of history, and Dr. Edward Heubel, associate professor of political science, will lecture. Dr. Howard Scarrow, assistant professor of political science, MSU (East Lansing), also will participate as a lecturer.

THE COURSE WILL be composed of five two-week blocks combining lectures and informal, small-group discussion - lecture the first meeting, discussion the second. Lectures will be complemented by a package of readings and classroom films. A collateral radio program on Pontiac station WYON- will precede each discussion meeting.

Accident Total Shows Drop

The total number of accidents in Birmingham in February showed an improvement over January and also over that of February a year ago. There were 59 accidents in February of this year as opposed to 80 in February, 1960 and 71 in January, 1961.

Personal injury accidents, with a total of 13 for February, increased over last February's total of eight but decreased from the January, 1961 figure of 19. Right-of-way violations again led the list of causative factors in traffic accidents during February and were present in 26 of the 59 accidents.

The 130 accidents investigated for January and February show 49 caused by right-of-way viola-

tions or 37 per cent. FOLLOWING too closely was indicated in 11 accidents and improper overtaking and making improper turns were indicated in seven and six of the accidents, respectively.

Some 24 persons were injured in February as against 28 in January but the February totals indicated an increase over the February injuries of 1960 which totaled nine. No fatalities occurred in February of this year. Efforts will be directed toward enforcement of traffic signal and stop sign violations and toward those areas shown as a cause of accidents, Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley said in the accident summary report issued for February.

To Receive Honor

The outstanding member of the Baldwin School safety patrol will be named as Birmingham's official safety patrol rally in Washington, D. C. May 11-14. This year's rally will mark the silver anniversary of the event. The local youngster will join

over 100 other top state patrolers for the four-day trip. The patrolers represent some 90 Michigan communities. The AAA is currently searching for the teacher who has the longest consecutive service as a patrol sponsor in Michigan, and that person and a patrol member of his or her choice will be special guests in the parade and other festivities.
