Beverly Hills Accepts New 12 Town Deal

BEVERLY HILLS—Litigation which has held up construction of the Twelve Town drain was one step closer to being settled with adoption of a resolution by Beverly Hills council at its meeting Tuesday night.

The resolution gives tentative approval to deletion of 552 acres in Madison Heights from the drainage district, and acceptance of the allocation of cost to Beverly Hills submitted by the county Drain Commission.

Beverly Hills' share of the drain is set at \$368,154, approximately \$10,000 more than its original allocation. Withdrawal of half of Madison Heights' acreage has raised the share of cost to each participating municipality.

BEVERLY HILLS became the seventh of 14 participating municipalities to adopt the compromise resolution. Madison Heights, Birmingham, Berkeley, Clawson and Oak Park have passed similar agreements.

Madison Heights is willing to withdraw an appeal to the United States Supreme Court, seeking withdrawal from Twelve Town drain, if all 14 cities in the drainage district adopt the compromise solution within 90 days.
