Already Sprayed

LATHRUP—Some 900 trees have been sprayed already in the city's tree-spraying program and \$1350 collected from residents. City Administrator Gerald Stone reported to the council Tuesday.

Stone said spraying will probably be completed in about two weeks and is moving ahead of schedule. Stone also noted that collectors were up over last year at this date.

Charter Study Group Appointed in Franklin

FRANKLIN—A whole new committee has been formed to act as a village charter study commission. Appointed by village president Calvert Thomas, the commission will review the charter and the proposed amendments to it. The commission will also study the proposed ordinance 2, 5 and 11. These cover the creation of the planning commission and building codes and zoning laws.

Appointees are Nicholas Rosello, chairman; councilman Robert Winkel and former president Harold Roseland and Grant Siver.

Others are Harry Rotter, Dr. Ralph Smith, Justice of the Peace Orland Ellis, Ellis Premeo and Richard Barnard. Thomas will serve as executive member.

The group will make a preliminary report with respect to areas of study on or before June 12 and submit final recommendations on or before Nov. 12.

THOMAS also re-assigned council responsibilities, naming Councilman J. Robert Mitchell new building department supervisor. He is charged with the administration and enforcement of zoning, swimming pool and building ordinances. Mitchell will also report on inter-governmental activities in adjacent communities, as well as governmental planning, which may include problems of annexation and city versus village forms.

Councilman Edward Green, relieved of building problems, was assigned to oversee police activity and public safety.

Councilman Donald Hunter will continue as president pro-tem, public information advisor, and parliamentarian.

Councilmen Eugene Kelly and William Kahn will handle village road issues, working with Street Administrator Norman Naimark, named for second year.

NEWLY-ELECTED Councilman Robert Winkel will sustain his past work as treasurer by supervising budget and fiscal matters. He will work closely with his successor, A. Newton Cole and with assessor Alfred Emmerling, the board of review and audit committee.

A standing committee was established.
