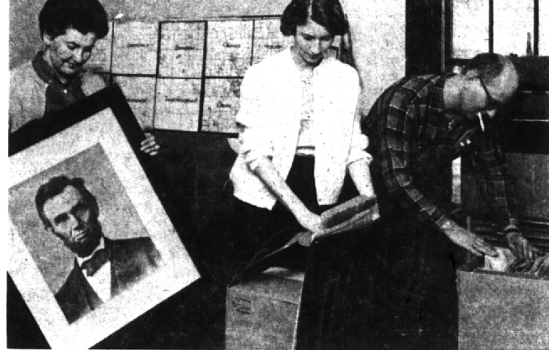

p.m. the next day, April 11, and Major Robert Anderson, federal commander at Sumter and a former West Point teacher of Borge-gard's, turned it down.  
THERE WAS considerable dis-cussion, exchanging notes, bow-ing and handshaking that night until Borgegard's aides announced early next morning that firing on Sumter would begin in one hour.  
And just as promised, at 4:30 a.m. April 12, the first shot of the Civil War flashed out from Moe-Island, arched across the dark sky and burst spectacularly on the fort's parapets.  
Then, howitzers and mortars let loose in pre-arranged pattern from all 47 batteries trained on Sum-ter, and the war was on.  
ANDERSON'S MEN, approxi-mately 100 facing an opponent of some 6,000, answered the fire at dawn. When they did, they received loud cheers from thousands of Charlestonians who thronged the waterfront to watch and ap-plaud good shooting — by either side.  
All day and all night the guns thundered on. Then, about 8:30 a.m. on the 13th, the fort caught fire.  
Major Anderson's men, unable to control the blaze, closed their powder magazine, dumped 50 barrels of powder into the burning crawls into the embrasures and lay flat, wet handkerchiefs over their mouths to brace against the fire, the flag lowered and Ander-son's men marched to beating drums from the fort, a cannon accident-ally exploded, killing the first man of the half million who were to die in the war.  
Next week: Wild enthusiasm greets the war.

**OK's Peddlers Law**  
Birmingham has a new ordinance governing peddlers and peddling. Adopted by city commissioners Monday night, it requires anyone peddling wares from house-to-house to purchase a license from the City. The law provides for a \$5 applica-tion fee and \$2 per day or \$25 per year for a peddler's license.  
COMMISSIONERS postponed ac-tion on a proposed charitable soli-citation ordinance pending a check with local churches and other fund-raising groups for their opinions.  
Commissioner Charles Remy is opposed to such a law on the basis that it is "an unnecessary burdensome regulation." He cited a "number of implied endorsement and intrusion on local activity."
