## Franklin Denies Sign Code Variance To Two Developers

FRANKLIN — Developers Leo Riley of Dorchester Hills and John L. Roberts of the McKinney Farms Subdivision failed recently to get relief from village advertising sign laws of the village. Appearing before the council, both made appeals to be allowed to use bigger advertising techniques to attract customers to their new development projects. ROBERTS asked for an amendment of the zoning ordinance which would permit the use of lights, signs or flags. Riley requested a variance to the code on the same purpose. Both were denied, on the basis that the council could not make separate allowances for some retailers.

## S'field Schools Viewing TV's Possibilities

SOUTHFIELD — A seven-man committee, studying the utilization of television as a teaching tool, has suggested a five-step procedure for using in Southfield's school system. Committee members are James McCune, William Adcock, Robert Grumlett, James Hildebrand, Daniel Julien, Helen McIntyre and Norman Ostead, assistant superintendent of schools. Final facilities proposed would include a total program for the school system with closed circuit presentations as well as those provided by educational stations. Step one suggests the purchase of UHF-VHF receivers for each school. All would use channel 56. Birney, Lebery and Lathrup would be wired to receive channels 72 and 76, broadcast from Purdue University experimental airborne system.

STEP TWO proposes the purchase of 14 additional receivers to extend use of airborne viewing to all schools and supports wiring high school and junior high schools to receive television and ready them for closed circuit viewing. Step three includes the purchase of additional receivers, and wiring remaining schools in all rooms as well as preparing them for closed circuit TV. Purchase of camera, monitor, and other equipment for high and junior highs is also suggested. Step four involves connection of highs and junior highs by cable, or connection of all schools if a microwave system is used. Step five provides for purchase of equipment necessary for use of a closed circuit system and complete wiring of all schools to this type system. The proposals will be sent to the school board.

## Golf Clubs, Balls Taken by Burglars

SOUTHFIELD — Twelve dozen golf balls and an assortment of new golf clubs were taken from the Sinclair Golf Range, 26100 Northwestern Highway when it was broken into early this week. The theft was reported at 11:09 a.m. Tuesday. Police said entry was effected by removing a shutter from a rear window and breaking the glass. Value of the golf equipment was estimated at \$275.85.

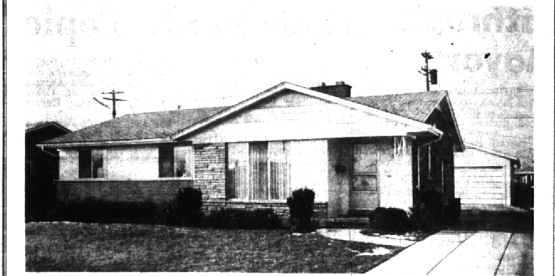
