

Kirk in Hills Plans Recital

Wendell Westcott, carillonist at Michigan State University, will be the guest artist at the Kirk in the Hills opening summer carillon recital at 4 p.m. Sunday.

Westcott, who graduated with the highest rating ever issued by the famous Royal Carillon School in Mechelen, Belgium, will feature the works of Bach, Mendelssohn, Mozart and Bizet, as well as one of his own compositions.

The author of an instruction book on the carillon, Westcott has composed many works for both carillon and English lute and has created more than a thousand carillon arrangements.

LAST SUMMER Westcott was featured at the dedicatory recital of the Kirk's 77-bell carillon. Recognized as the world's largest in number of bells, the Kirk carillon weighs a total of 92,000 pounds. The largest, or "bourdon," bell weighs over six tons and is nearly seven feet in diameter. The smallest bell weighs 14 pounds and is only six inches in diameter.

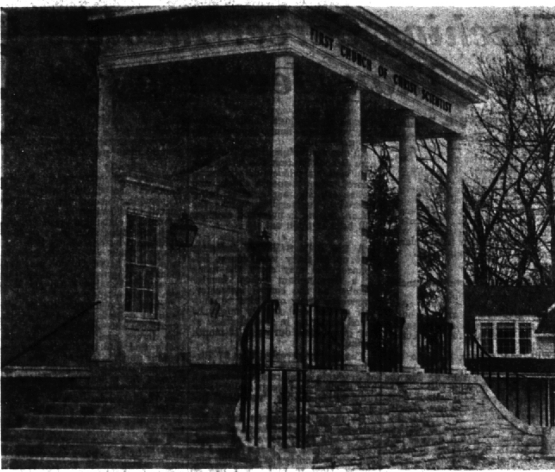
