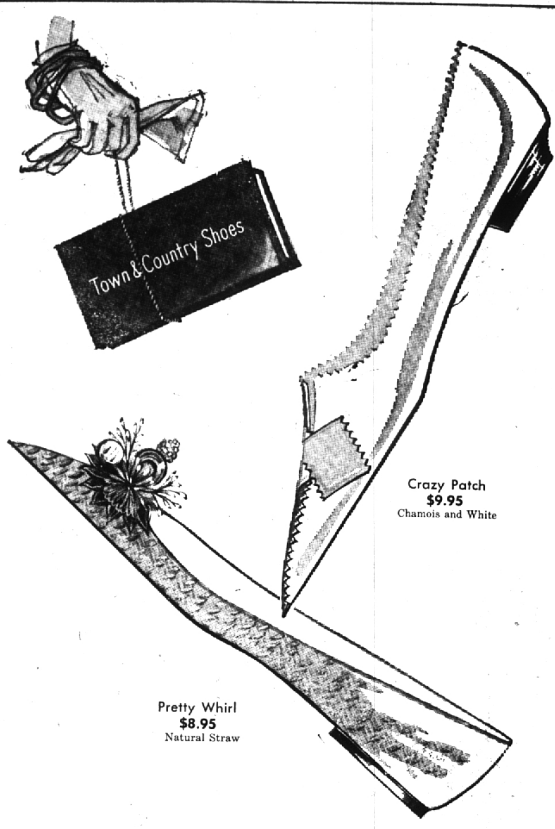
**Republican Women

**Expect Ruling
In Minor Suit**

A ruling on a motion to dismiss Chrysler Corp.'s lawsuit against Jack W. Minor of Birmingham is expected within the next week, according to Circuit Court Judge Clark J. Adams. The announcement came after Minor's attorney, Edward P. Echlin, submitted a legal brief supporting his Feb. 9 motion to dismiss. In a suit filed Feb. 3 in Oakland County, Chrysler asked for an accounting of the assets Minor received as former director of the Plymouth-DeSoto-Valiant Division from four subsidiary companies which Chrysler did business with.

IN TWO SUITS filed Jan. 9 in Detroit, Minor asked for \$200,000 for damages to his reputation after his dismissal and another \$25,000 as his share in a Chrysler stock-ownership program. According to Echlin the Detroit suits should take precedent and Judge Adams should not proceed with the firm's suit until settlement of Minor's suits. Echlin supports his motion to dismiss the company's lawsuit by referring to an injunction issued by Circuit Judge Henry L. Beers. The injunction restrained former Chrysler President William C. Newberg from proceeding with his lawsuit in Pontiac against President and Board Chairman L. L. Colbert until lawsuits in Wayne County Circuit Court between Newberg and Colbert are settled.

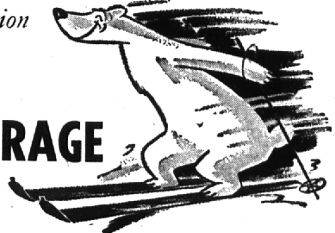

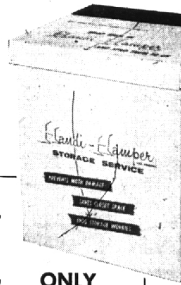
