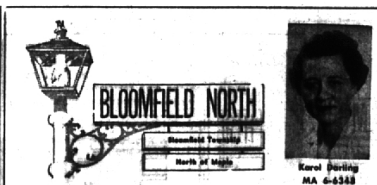

Ralph Pulliam, 2195 Pembroke, president of the group, assisted by Mrs. Pulliam, is in charge of the event.

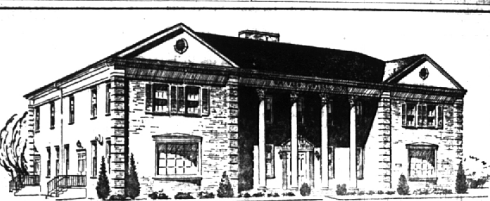
