Mothers to Attend Fashion Show

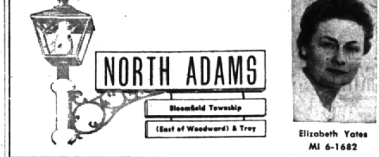
